Dear Old Rhodians and Friends

Rhodes University’s Community Engagement division recently held a week-long trade event in honour of Madiba’s centenary birthday, during Trading LIVE for Mandela Week between 18-24 July. The 151 successful events that were run over six days included participation from Rhodes University and 70 different organisations in the broader Grahamstown, including schools, businesses and non-governmental organisations.



On 14 August, a Trading LIVE storytelling exhibition was held at Eden Grove, to showcase some of the trade stories captured by the Journalism Department’s 3rd-year students through [video](#), radio, photography, and an 8-page insert published in Grocott’s Mail.

With August being Woman’s Month, a number of activities took place at the University. The Equity & Institutional Culture Office organised the Silent Protest, which launched on 3 August, with a T-shirt distribution, a Die-In in memory of those who passed away as a result of gender-based violence, and a Breaking the Silence vigil in the evening.



The following week, a series of talks and discussions took place both at the University and at Nombulelo Secondary School. These included Professor Pumla Gqola, Mx Andile Gaeleswe, Advocate Nicola Turner, Dr Benita Moolman, Dr Thulane Gxubane, Mx Lisa

Vetten, and Captain Majova.

To end off the week, visual artist and India-based women's rights activist Mx Aquí Thami, was sponsored by the BACK.TALK Womxn's Collective, to host a poster-making workshop for interested students who wanted to reflect on or process their own experiences with gender-based violence.

Sadly, this time coincided with the death of one of Rhodes' beloved BA Law students, Khensani Maseko, who took her own life on 3 August, following a rape she had reported to the University on 30 July.



An academic shutdown took place over two days, during which students were encouraged to reflect on Khensani's death and to attend the various talks and workshops the University had planned for that week. A commemorative march to The Monument took place on 7 August, where students assembled and expressed their thoughts about Khensani's death and the scourge of gender-based violence in our communities.

Khensani's funeral, which was attended by Dr Mabizela and representatives from the Rhodes University SRC, took place in Johannesburg on 10 August.

Old Rhodian Union bursaries

Twenty-eight hard-working students received bursaries totalling R225 000 from the Old Rhodian Union this year.

Traditionally, the Old Rhodian Union has exclusively funded undergraduates, but thanks to alumni signing up for the MySchool card and designating Rhodes University as a beneficiary, the bursaries now extend to postgraduates as well. The University is currently receiving approximately R1500 per month from this initiative, at no extra cost to the cardholder.




Ways of Giving survey

Death of an esteemed Council Member

A memorial service was held for Neville Errol Woollgar, Vice-Chair of the Rhodes University Council on 3 August at the Rhodes Chapel.

Neville served on our Council for 43 years as the Vice-Chair of Council and Chairperson of the Finance and General Purposes (F&GP) Committee of Council. During this time, he contributed his time, expertise, and resources as a trustee of the Pension and Provident funds, on the Audit Committee, the Joint Planning Committee, as a Council representative on Senate, and through his personal contributions and the support of individual students by the BK Trust of which he was the founding chairman.

Neville is survived by his beloved wife, Bev, his two children, three stepchildren, six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Bitter Aloes by Marion Baxter







