

DVC AWARDS MESSAGE

Rhodes University (RU) celebrates Community Engagement (CE) Awards annually in honour of our students, staff and community partners who dedicate their time towards making a difference in the local community, through service learning, engaged research or engaged citizenry. Their efforts are always commendable.

As we celebrate 120 years of RU's existence, resilience and success, we must also celebrate the 15 years of

strong Community Engagement at Rhodes University and strengthen our plans for CE to become a significant anchor that will turn the state of Makhanda around. This will be in support of our vision and mission to achieve "a just and sustainable society". Although we have a "leading community engagement programme embedded within the mainstream research, teaching and learning endeavours of the University" (RU IDP 2023-2028: 34) and have made significant strides promoting and ensuring that the University embraces CE, there is still much to be done to ensure that this important role of higher education is well understood and implemented. The purpose of a university is commonly understood as that of preparing students for a career and for contributing to the country's economy through knowledge generation. 

2022 VC'S DISTINGUISHED COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AWARD WINNER

It was with great pleasure that we announced the winners of the 2022 Vice Chancellor's Distinguished Award for Community Engagement; the Joza Assumption Development Centre (ADC) Counselling Hub established by the Psychology Department team, Ms Napolle Msomi, Dr Duane Booysen, Prof Megan Campbell, Christine Lewis and Mandisa Ndabula.

The work of the Hub was made possible through partnership building and collaboration between the ADC, Rhodes Psychology Clinic and the Rhodes Student Counselling Centre (SCC). The history of the Hub is also manifold and involves strong partnership building. Several years ago, **Prof. Jacqui Akhurst** founded a smaller counselling service for pupils at Nombulelo Secondary and Joza Youth Hub. During the COVID pandemic, Ms. Napobile Msomi offered school leaders, teachers and pupils online counselling support sessions. Out of these various efforts and partnerships, the ADC Counselling Hub was built. Therefore, it is not surprising that an outstanding feature of this organic project was the team members' in-depth understanding of partnership building as a key component in the application of community engagement in higher education.

The application highlighted that "an intervention focused on addressing the needs as identified by the community partner, within their particular context. It challenges the psychologist to work in collaboration with their community partner to bring about interventions that meet these needs and in so doing the psychologist respects and promotes the community partner's agency for change. One of the most practical, concretely visible ways in which this approach is applied, is by taking psychology to the community partner, in their physical setting. While most South African professional training programmes offer a community psychology component, few currently integrate this with a service-learning component. However, CBSL is a very effective vehicle for teaching the principles and practice of community psychology to our student psychologists. It is also a revolutionary way of understanding how psychology could (and should) be practiced in South Africa".

The Hub has transformed the Rhodes University space by building on the principles of community psychology and community-based service learning within the Masters in Counselling and Clinical Psychology programmes, as well as in the internship year completed by Counselling Psychologist Interns at the Rhodes Student Counselling Centre. In this way, it has responded timeously, effectively and collaboratively to fulfil a moral and political imperative by addressing social and epistemic injustices. The Hub provides counselling and psychological support beyond the university space, whilst developing key skills of university students and academics.

The Hub has implemented and succeeded in its aims of:

- 1) Providing mental health resources in the form of free individual counselling and psychoeducational groups/workshops for people living in Joza and accessing services at the ADC, particularly Makhanda youth.
- 2) Facilitating a community based service-learning training opportunity in community psychology for the Masters in Counselling and Clinical Psychology students at the Rhodes Psychology Clinic, and the Counselling Psychology Interns at the Rhodes Student Counselling Centre.

The project is commended for its specific understanding and implementation of community engagement and service learning to facilitate the teaching and learning of community psychology at Rhodes University through a collaborative partnership. Modules of community psychology in the Masters in Counselling and Clinical Psychology programmes provide students with a theoretical lens, framework and orientation towards psychological intervention that challenges many of the typical western hegemonic biomedical conceptions of how to bring about health and wellbeing. With a specific focus on partnerships, this theoretical approach promotes understanding of mental health needs and priorities within a cultural context of social action/social liberation model that recognizes and emphasizes the impact of social and structural inequalities. More importantly, the university team members are immensely applauded for their **IMAGINATION** and courage as they work towards transforming curriculum to be contextually relevant in Community Psychology and building a sense of **place** with their community partner, the ADC.



ADC, the main community partner, is a skills training and small business development centre situated in the heart of Joza managed by **Mr Maso Nduna**, an alumni of Rhodes University. When the ADC identified psycho-education and counselling support as additional services it would like to offer as part of its transformational vision, the Hub was developed.

The selection committee strongly believe that the inclusive, participatory partnership development process of the Hub, the trust and commitment that exists between the diverse partners and the existing impact of the Hub on the youth of Makhanda are significant indicators of a sustainable, purposeful community engagement programme.

The Hub team is comprised of a wide-range of individuals not mentioned above and whom were critical to its success. These include the ADC Centre Manager, Maso Nduna and Madoda Mkalipi, Prof Jacqui Akhurst who won the award in 2018 and the Interns and Masters students who provided the quality day to day service.

Rhodes University Community Engagement (RUCE) 2023 Highlights

The Rhodes University vision is 'to be to be foremost in the generation and advancement of locally responsive & globally engaged knowledge that seeks to create a just & sustainable society'. The mission states that through transformative, rigorous scholarship and research, the university aims to advance human understanding and wisdom, cultivate graduates who are caring and engaged citizens, responsible, courageous and ethical leaders and to drive equitable and inclusive development through mutually beneficial partnerships. Through its nexus with teaching and research, community engagement (CE) enables and promotes the Rhodes University vision and mission with strategic intent.

2023 is the 15th Anniversary of the introduction of Community Engagement as a core function of Rhodes University. The University has gone some way to anchoring itself in the Makhanda community by contributing to various sectors. Being an educational institution has meant that we have started by investing heavily in the public education sector working to position Makhanda as a Centre of Education Excellence nationally. We are also working with community-university partnerships to contribute to the revitalisation of our economy and the health sector.

This report shares the highlights of 2023 providing evidence of the contribution and impact of Rhodes University CE on community development.

1. External Donor Partnerships

CE is an unfunded national mandate and it's for this reason that we are deeply indebted to external donors who contribute to the repositioning and transformation of universities through CE. In 2023, RUCE enjoyed the financial and moral support of the following donor partners: Ms Zanele Twala from the Standard Bank Tutuwa Community Foundation, Ms Vuyo Mwase from the Energy Mobility Education Trust, Mr Paul Smith from the Kagiso Fund, Ms Barbara Proudfoot from the KAVOD Trust, Ryan Redman from the Flourish Foundation and John Williams from GBS Local Bank for being so meaningfully committed to the transformation of the Makhanda community.



2. Economic Development

A new programme, the Masakhe Social Enterprise Development (SED) Programme focussing on the promotion of small Black business development was established in April this year through a dynamic partnership between the RU Procurement Office, Business School, RUCE and the Assumption Development Centre (ADC) in Joza. Four established small businesses will be supported through the Supplier Development Programme and 19 new businesses will be supported with equipment and/or business branding through Enterprise Development. A further 40 young people will benefit through a targeted training programme to translate their ideas into initiatives. We are very encouraged by this new development and the partnership with the Joza based ADC Hub.

3. Health Sector Development

In the health sector, we are deepening a long standing partnership between Rhodes University and the District Health Department under the leadership of Dr Mohammed Docrat. The partnership involves a number of Rhodes University departments (Psychology, Pharmacy, Information Systems and HKE) participating in service learning, engaged research and engaged citizenry (volunteer) programmes. The Pharmacy department has placed students in the Clinics, IS is implementing electronic systems and HKE is running an extensive programme with over 130 top athletes in Joza and has various wellness interventions at the school level. The Psychology Department have established a permanent counselling facility at the Assumption Development Centre offering free daily counselling services for pupils and their families. The training Psychologists also offer preventative workshops in the schools as well as career guidance. We are now in the process of working with Dr Docrat to extend services at the Joza Clinic through a new infrastructure development project. Hopefully this new vision will ultimately take the pressure off the hospitals.

The winner of the **2022 Vice Chancellor's Distinguished Award for Community Engagement** was a group award led by Ms Nqobile Msomi, Prof Megan Campbell, Dr Duane Booysen, Christine Lewis and Mandisa Ndabula from the Psychology Department in the Faculty of Humanities for the much needed ADC Counselling Hub they established in Joza offering free daily mental health services to schools



and the community in general. The success of the ADC Hub has been due to the collaboration and input of this Team as well as the ADC staff, the Masters (M1 and M2) students and the experience of Prof Jacqui Ackhurst who supervised the students.

4. Engaged Research.

It has been pleasing to note that the research output for 2023 continues on an upward trajectory. In order to firmly establish Community Engagement as a core function of Universities, we need to contribute to the scholarship of engagement and grow the national body of knowledge in the emerging discipline of CE.

RUCE organized the **2023 Community Engagement Learning Symposium**. This is the 7th biennial symposium which took the form of a blended event. CHERTL Ed Tech team played a key role in making the online element a success. The Symposium attracted 22 South African universities and 10 International universities. A total of 164 people attended (123 from HEI's, 25 students and 16 community partners). The international universities that presented included: Cornell University, Universidad de la República de Uruguay, Universidad Nacional de Mar del Plata Argentina, King's College London, Stanford University, University of Michigan, University of Oxford, West Virginia University, Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul in Brazil and University of Gulu, Uganda.

Overcoming the challenge of the Ethics Application Process for Engaged Researchers.

The Human Ethics Research Committee developed a two-tiered ethics application process for engaged research studies. The first tier involves a scoping approval for initial community engagement, followed by a proposal submission informed by community input. This allows for engagement with the potential community partner to negotiate the topic and the research process.

The new African Journal for Higher Education Community Engagement (AJHECE) has been established by RUCE and hosted on the platform managed by the Rhodes University Library. The systems have been set up and we are very grateful to Prof Sizwe Mabizela for providing funding in the amount of R430,000 for the first three years. The first issue will be published in November 2023. We are grateful to



Dr Margie Maistry, Editor in Chief for driving this process and Wynand van der Walt from the Library who is managing the registration and the site. This Journal will provide a much needed platform for engaged scholarship in South Africa, across Africa and for international partnerships that contribute to CE in South Africa and the rest of Africa.

Roundtables on Engaged Research Community of Practice (CoP)

The Engaged Research Community of Practice hosted three insightful roundtables this year, addressing engaged research challenges and opportunities, lessons learned from universities in the global South and North, and on Higher Education engaged research ethics support and limitations. Distinguished speakers, including Prof. Catriona Macleod, Prof. George Openjuru from Gulu University in Uganda, Prof. Budd Hall (UNESCO Co-Chair for CBPR, University of Victoria, Canada), Prof. Peter Clayton and Dr. Janet Hayward, shared their expertise and insights.

Other strategies to enhance Engaged Research include the appointment of **three Research Associates** (Dr Margie Maistry, Dr Sharli Paphitis and Dr Katy Pepper) who have all published this year. We are grateful to the Research Office for funding a post-doctoral fellow, Dr Lilymore Mudziwapasi who is fully involved in RUCE's programmes, research and submission of publications. The RU accredited Engaged Research short course continues to be in demand with three courses being offered this year.

Rhodes University is one of 22 **Knowledge for Change (K4C)** hubs that have been established in 16 countries as part of an International UNESCO Consortium. Two of our staff will be travelling to the USA to present at a Conference on Engaged Scholarship at Michigan State University held on 4 and 5 October 2023. The presentations cover the newly established AJHECE and the work of RUCE's K4C Hub and Engaged Research.

5. Teaching and Learning:

RUCE submitted the PGDip Higher Education Community Engagement qualification for approval in 2022 and may be on the agenda of the CHE Committee for the 27th September 2023. Meanwhile RUCE has engaged Margaret Irvine to work with the team to prepare the Facilitators Guide and



Student Information Booklet. This postgraduate professional development qualification at Level 8 is the first of its kind to be offered in South Africa.

In 2019, RUCE launched an accredited online short course, titled **Community Based Service Learning: What-Why-Where**. The course has done much to assist academics to launch quality SL programmes as it has equipped them with the necessary theoretical knowledge and practical skills. In 2023, two courses were offered at RU and a further course at the University of Zululand. The Rhodes University Institutional Development Plan (IDP) requires RUCE to grow the number of SL programmes and RUCE is grateful to the University for providing annual funding of R525 000 for this purpose. In 2022, there were a total of 41 courses with 22 new courses established this year, making it a total of 63 courses currently running across the 6 faculties, reflecting a 58% increase.

CE Orientation for 1st Years:

Working in partnership with the Division of Student Services (DSSD) and Development, RUCE leads a CE short course for all first year students. The second element to the orientation course includes the 'Exploring Makhanda' bus trip around Makhanda East and West for students to learn more about the city they will be living and contributing to. RUCE is grateful to the DSSD for funding the transport for the Exploring Makhanda tour.

- The CEO Course, spanning Terms 1 and 2, played an important role in introducing 1st year students to the concept of Community Engagement in Higher Education. Notably, the students showed a positive response and a clear understanding of their roles as caring and compassionate citizens contributing to the Makhanda community.
- The SRC CE Residence representatiives play a key role in this programme which has given them much direction for their role in community engagement. They are also trained as 'tour guides'.

6. Engaged Citizenry

RUCE has 12 accredited short courses registered which form the theoretical basis of all the Engaged Citizenry (Volunteer) Programmes as reported below.



VC's Education Initiative: 2017 - 2023

The VC Programme and other initiatives have achieved considerable progress in the past eight years. Some of the outcomes achieved include the following:

- The matric pass rate has increased from 62% in 2015 to 85% in 2022. This is 5% higher than the National Average and 8% higher than the EC Provincial Average.
- The number of Bachelor passes produced has increased from 179 in 2015 to 305 in 2022.
- The school drop-out rate has dropped from 43% in 2015 to 35% in 2022.
- The number of local disadvantaged students who have gained access to Rhodes University has increased tenfold over the past decade, from 11 in 2012 to over 200 in 2023.
- Rhodes students are the heart and soul of the Vice-Chancellor's Initiative (VCI):
 4 926 students have volunteered over the past six years and approximately 490 students are involved in the VCI's on an annual basis, either as volunteers or in service learning programmes.
- Researching volunteerism and the scholarship of engagement: The VC's
 Programme recognises all three key areas of the academic project research,
 teaching and learning, and community engagement. The 2021 establishment
 of 'the Nine Tenths Research Group', dedicated to engaged research on the
 highly successful Nine Tenths Mentoring has expanded to all programmes and is
 a significant step toward achieving the sustainable integration of research and
 community engagement.
- Developing School Leadership: The Aspiring Leaders course for promising school leadership is currently being offered pro bono by the RU Business School.
- The Circle of Unity have diligently organised and supported the Makhanda Principals Forum which meets regularly and engages on multiple topics affecting them. They are the lead organisers of the 2024 Education Summit which is an exciting development.

2023 Nine Tenths Matric Mentoring Programme

- A strong partnership in its 8th year with GADRA Education has strengthened the work at Nsika, Nombulelo, Kutliso Daniels and Mary Waters Secondary Schools.
- Nine Tenths started the year on a high note with 116 bachelor passes, 61
 Diploma passes from the 2022 cohort. The Makhanda Class of 2022 achieved



an excellent pass rate of 85% and the Vice Chancellor's Education schools (Khutliso Daniels, Mary Waters, Nombulelo and Ntsika) contributed 91% to the city's pass).

- A significant achievement is the increase in the number of Bachelor passes, reaching 305 in 2022, a substantial improvement from previous years.
 Importantly, the contribution of no-fee schools has risen significantly, with 66% of Bachelor passes originating from these institutions.
- In a historic moment, Nombulelo, a no-fee school, achieved the highest number of bachelor passes, securing 80 in total. Moreover, the programme has fostered a sense of commitment among mentors, leading to improved student results.
- The programme's impact extends to the academic excellence of its participants, with two no-fee schools, Makhanda East, outperforming fee-paying public schools. Kutliso Daniels secured second place in the city with an 88.9% pass rate, and Nombulelo claimed third place with an 87.4% pass rate. VG led with a perfect 100% pass rate, demonstrating the program's commitment to quality education.
- For 2023, there have been 110 active, trained RU student volunteers (of which 16 were student leaders) reaching 224 Gr 12 pupils in four local no-fee paying High schools for individual mentoring
- In April 2023, the programme celebrated the graduation of 26 former Nine-Tenths mentees who obtained degrees or post-graduate degrees from Rhodes University.
- This year the intentional use of senior student leaders as co-facilitators has created an environment conducive to knowledge sharing and team bonding, this is in line with the RU tag line of 'where leaders learn'.
- RU Mentors have assisted Mentees to apply for registration, to date 51 online applications have been successful and a further 20 have provisional acceptance.

BuddingQ Literacy Programme for Gr R and Gr 1.

The Budding Q programme has been adopted by Partner Organisations who
extend the reach to children in the community. This is exactly the sustainable
and multiplying effect that RUCE is trying to achieve through building and



sharing models.

- In total, the Budding Q programme works with 13 sites engaging over 200 volunteers weekly and reaching approximately 500 children. The partner organisations who have adopted the programme include Kingswood College, St Mary's DCC and the Amakhala Foundation (Sidbury School).
- This year a significant focus of BuddingQ has been impact measurement. As such there have been various research projects undertaken in multiple collaborative groups. Student Leaders presented the programme at the CE Learning Symposium in May, demonstrating the impact of BuddingQ on both students and children's development. A research paper on the effectiveness of BuddingQ on Children's Literacy and Motor Development is currently under a journal review and a further study of the long term effects of BuddingQ on children's English literacy abilities is in its final stages.
- By all indications BuddingQ seems to be making a significant impact not only
 on children's motor development but also on the practice of teachers who
 are part of the programme.

Project Read

Project Read is a targeted Grade 1 literacy development initiative in Makhanda that places a strong emphasis on developing conventional literacy abilities in line with the Science of Reading research. Managed by the Lebone Centre, the programme involves training and mobilizing volunteers to work in seven local schools. Schools are chosen based on their readiness to adopt the programme.

- In 2023 three groups of volunteers are actively engaged with their respective schools. In total, 94 facilitators provide weekly support to 270 Grade 1 children.
- RU Volunteers are working at CM Vellem and Ntaba Maria, Education Faculty 2nd Year Teaching Practicum students are supporting Good Shepherd and Makana Primary, and Lebone interns are involved with George Dickerson and Grahamstown Primary.
- The progress of Project Read is evident through pre and post assessment tests revealing that two significant achievements at the participating schools have been recorded: 55% of children dramatically improved their letter sound knowledge and show more motivation and aptitude toward reading.



CERCO (Community Engagement Reading Club Orientation)

- This programme is designed and led by Professor Sam Naidu from the Literary Studies in the English Language Department working with 10 dedicated student volunteers.
- Each Reading Club is guided by a dedicated group of volunteers who work with teachers and learners to promote literacy development and reading for enjoyment.
- These volunteers, serving at CM Vellem and Good Shepherd, actively engage with Grade 2 and 3 classes to foster a love for reading among students. Additionally, the Lebone Centre oversees two more reading clubs at Grahamstown Primary and George Dickerson, further expanding the programme's reach.

Vulindlela Parent Engagement Programme

The Vulindlela Programme targets RU Support Staff and their school going children who are in Grades 10 to 12. The parents in the programme have learned how to manage their homes effectively to promote educational success, and students have shown remarkable improvement in their academic performance.

- In 2023, the Vulindlela programme has a total number of 39 parents and 46 learners. The learners come from 7 local High Schools.
- 12 active Student Volunteers and 2 Student Leaders have attended over 85
 % of the tutoring and mentoring sessions. Activities take place in the Faculty of
 Education every Saturday mornings in term time.
- There are two service learning courses embedded in the Vulindlela programme. The first is a partnership between 22 3rd year School of Journalism and Media Studies (JMS) students and 5 no-fee High Schools in Makhanda. The activity involved fundraising and the provision of 600 SD cards, loaded with carefully selected study materials for Grade 12 learners. The loading of the 32gb cards is followed up with reflective articles written on the project by the JMS students.
- The second service learning course is the Financial Life Skills course which is offered to the Parents of the Vulindlela Programme over 5 weeks. This course is linked to the Rhodes University Management Department and is offered in partnership with the GBS Mutual Bank. The Management students are part of class discussions, mentoring support for participants (parents) and mark the assignments. 14 Certificates were awarded to parents in 2023.



High School Tutoring and Mentoring Programme

- A total of 5 organisations-lkamva Youth, Inkululeko, Khanya Maths and Science, Sophumelela were involved in the High School Tutoring and Mentoring Programme this year, RUCE is pleased to welcome PJ Olivier as a new partner.
- 85 active student volunteers worked in the 5 selected sites.
- A notable highlight this year was a campus visit organized by RUCE and Student Leader Simphiwe Malinga for the PJ Olivier learners and teachers and motivational talks presented by Prof. Euvrard (retired Dean of Education) and Babsie Makombe from GADRA.

Young Warriors Cricket Development Programme

- A multi stakeholder partnership between RUCE, HKE, Kingswood College, the Gary Kristen Foundation, Grahamstown Primary School, St Mary's Primary and George Dickerson has seen the birth of the Young Warriors Cricket Programme.
- Four unemployed young people were identified and trained as Cricket Coaches through an online cricket programme provided by the Gary Kirsten Foundation. RUCE raised funding from GBS for the construction of two sets of cricket nets, Kingswood donated astro turf and the GK Foundation contributed the funding for the coaches monthly stipend. Full cooperation and buy in from the Principals has meant that the programme has gotten off to a good start.

Siyakhana@Makhanda Programme (CE for Residences)

- The momentum in the Residence space was very encouraging this year as
 the 54 elected CE Residence Representatives were active and exercised their
 leadership. Together with their 15 Community Partner Organisation Managers,
 they were trained in Asset Based Community Development (ABCD) in March
 2023.
- Each Hall was partnered with an Early Childhood Development Centre
 which allows for relationship building, ensuring continuity. Phase one
 involved joint planning around an identified project, phase two was the joint
 implementation and phase three, evaluating and celebrating the success.
 Each week saw over 100 students working in the 15 ECD sites to achieve
 their shared goals.

 The Residential Operations Division kindly contributed to the transport costs enabling effective initiation and execution of their community engagement initiatives.

Societies and Sport Clubs

- The Societies and Sport Clubs experienced significant growth and a newfound sense of independence in how they engaged in collaborative partnerships within the Makhanda community. One of the outstanding achievements of the year was the way in which different societies came together to collaborate on addressing pressing social issues together. As examples, 7 societies collaborated to support the Home of Joy and eight Societies collaborated with Victoria Girls High School.
- RU Societies and Sports Clubs faced a number of difficulties to start the year, including a limited budget for community engagement projects. The main focus this year was to partner societies and sports clubs with local primary schools, which resulted in some exciting initiatives. Although it was a slow start, Societies and Sports Clubs ended up having a good year.

7. RU Social Innovation Hub

- Digital Storytelling has had exciting developments with the workshops being restructured into three separate accredited short courses. Nine workshops have been facilitated this year, benefitting PSAM, Social Psychology 201 and in-service B.Ed students amongst others. 28 participants have qualified for certificates for the DST for Social Innovation Course.
- Two exhibitions of digital stories made in the workshops have been held in partnership with Makana Tourism and The Black Power Station.
- The Basic Computer Skills course started in March 2023 with 62 enrolled participants, six student leaders and 23 student volunteers. Five of the participants were from the community and 57 were Rhodes staff (part-time and full-time).
- RUCE's Digital resource library has continued to be used by RUCE's partner organisations and programmes including GADRA Education, Awarenett and Vulindlela to run mobile labs for learners.
- RUCE also loaned equipment to partners, community members and students with over 350 devices or accessories being used.



• RUCE conducted five Business for Better discussions in partnership with Rhodes Business School, establishing a community of 20 aspiring entrepreneurs.

8. Other:

RUCE's Community Engagement Faculty Representatives have been supportive this year and worked hard to ensure CE is embedded into the Faculty and reports are written and presented at Faculty Board Meetings. A special thanks to the following representatives Humanities - Prof Sam Naidu, Science - Prof Lizanne Raubenheimer, Education - Ms Angi Jones, Law - Adv Shuaib Rahim, Pharmacy - Ms Farisai Chiwanza and Dr Xolile Antoni from Commerce.

Thanks must go to the VC, Professor Sizwe Mabizela, DVC's Prof Mabokang Monnapula-Mapesela, Senior Management and other Colleagues who have played key roles to build the community engagement space. RUCE is blessed to have leadership across the university that truly understand the strategic value of community engagement in higher education.

Lastly to the hard working RUCE staff, its been a full and productive year, especially made possible by outstanding team work. Your commitment to social justice and to shaping and remaking a more just and sustainable community is acknowledged.
