ailing from the vibrant town of Makhanda, the 21-year-old Computer Science Honours student's life story is a testament to the power of diverse experiences that shape our perspectives.

Growing up, Quinlan was fortunate to have experienced various cultures and living environments, instilling in him a deep appreciation for diversity. He carries this appreciation forward into his life's mission, driven by a burning passion for impactful community work that leaves a lasting legacy.

In his quest to make a difference, Quinlan founded the 'MMYM' Programme, which stands for "Men Mentoring Young Men". This transformative initiative seeks to empower the younger generation by connecting them with older mentors who impart valuable skills and expose them to new experiences.

Quinlan's motivation is clear:

"My initial idea for the project was to teach younger boys things that I wish I had known at their age," he said.

With the unwavering support of friends, family, and professionals, this inspirational programme has been running for over two years, conducting weekly sessions at Makhanda's Eluxolweni Child and Youth Care Centre. It provides guidance and mentorship to 20 to 25 boys annually, ranging from ages 6 to 18, in pursuit of the Centre's mission to nurture schooling and life skills development.

Together, we can inspire tomorrow's leaders and make a brighter future for all.





The impact of MMYM transcends generational boundaries, offering a wide array of sessions facilitated by experts, including the Rhodes University's Squash team and the National Council of Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (NSPCA). ce-Chancellor Professor Sizwe Bishop Storey's Mabizela says distinguished "sustained and contribution as a fearless and leading figure in the anti-apartheid struggle and as a champion of nation-building following the 1994 democratic elections has spanned more than six decades."

The University says Bishop Storey's impact can be traced to his profound contribution to the anti-apartheid struggle in the 1960s. His other contributions include his chaplaincy to the Rivonia Trialists on Robben Island, his activist ministry resisting the District Six removals, and turning the Central Methodist Church in Johannesburg into a famous focus of mass democratic protest in the 1970s and 1980s.

He also reached maximum prominence within and outside South Africa as the President of the South African Council of Churches and Methodist Bishop of Johannesburg before and during the State of Emergency and through the transition to democratic elections.

t the bursary function, which took place in August, President of the Association of Old Rhodians, Professor Rod Walker, explains that the Association aims to sustainably provide bursaries to Rhodes University students to ensure that present and future students are financially supported in their studies.

In 2000, Association bursaries worth R80 000 were granted.

Professor Walker emphasises the awards are based on academic performance and financial need. He explains that MySchool bursaries are awarded to the students studying education, which aligns with the MySchool programme.

He encourages all to apply for a MySchool card to raise funds for the Association. The University's Vice-Chancellor, Professor Sizwe Mabizela, agrees.

He explains a competition will be held with all graduates during the 120th birthday in 2024. The alumni will compete to raise the most funds for the Association.

The Association bursaries continue to assist many students financially throughout their undergraduate and postgraduate studies.

A 2023 recipient, Kyra Chikuwha, explains that her fees to Rhodes University were piling up after her guardian was retrenched during COVID-19.

She admits her guardian's emotional motivation letter must have convinced the committee to grant her the bursary.

Now a third-year student at Rhodes University, she says her guardian has been a fantastic role model and encouraged reading and learning.

The Association of Old Rhodians is the new name of the Old Rhodian Union which was renamed in September 2023.



HISTORY MADE AS **THE SRC ALUMNI BOARD LAUNCHES**

NOSTALGIA AND INNOVATION INTERTWINED AS CURRENT STUDENT **REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL (SRC) AND SRC ALUMNI GATHERED TO** LAUNCH THE SRC ALUMNI BOARD ON 12 AUGUST 2023. THIS HISTORIC MOMENT SAW A FUSION OF PAST AND PRESENT, BIRTHING A NEW ERA FOR PRESERVING THE SRC LEGACY.

he SRC Alumni Board is co-chaired by the 2021 SRC President, Leboghang Nkambule, and the 2019 SRC President, Samkelo Mngadi. The tentative steps for setting up the Board were taken in 2018/19.

Disrupted by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Board reconnected in 2021, resulting in the SRC Alumni Board Policy taking shape. The vision of this Board is clear: to create and maintain a community of alumni elders and former and experienced members of the Rhodes University SRC that support the current SRC through advice, mentorship, expertise, donations, and fundraising.

Reflecting on the SRC legacy and advancing the future, Student Development and Support Officer Eric Ofei introduced the slogan driving this initiative. "We are retired but not tired" - a phrase brought forward by Rolihlala Mabaso, President of the 2017 SRC, that sets the tone and standard for the continued successful collaboration within the SRC culture. "This sentiment is a profound idea that speaks to our journey, commitment, and aspirations. It underscores that stepping back from

an active role is not a retreat into complacency. Instead, it is an evolution into a new phase of contribution. One driven by experience, insight, and a desire to empower those following in our footsteps," elaborates Mr Ofei.



The current SRC President, Avuxeni Tyala, concurs: "The most essential part is continuity. Just because you are passing the baton does not mean your mission is done. A perfect example of this is everybody sitting in this room - the alumni network."



She also mentions the importance of creating a safe space: "We have become more epithetic. We have become more individualistic. More, 'this is not my struggle, this is your struggle', and it is because of that lack of continuity. We are an institution of support. We are because of the foundation that has been set."


The theme of giving back is emphasised during the address by the Manager of Alumni Relations and Stakeholder Engagement, Luyanda Bheyile. He gives enlightening examples of the inspiring work done by Rhodes University alumni, mentioning a few projects in the making, including the formalising of the Alumni Chapters and a recent initiative, being the establishment of the iHlumo Scholarship, spearheaded by a group of former SRC members, to fund an undergraduate student. This scholarship aligns closely with the core values of Rhodes University's responsible citizenry ethos.

There was a tangible sense of optimism in the future of the Board and the alumni network as Bheyile's presentation drew to a close. "At this stage, you are the torchbearers of the legacy of this important initiative. As we reminisce about the memories we've created, let us not forget the responsibility that comes with our achievements.

"We are privileged to have had access to an exceptional quality of education Rhodes University has to offer. With privilege comes the duty to give back. We have to support future generations of students, to open doors for those who come after us, and to create a world where everyone has access to the transformative power of education."

Proceedings of the launch included energetic, interactive activities that continued a collaborative culture between the current and alumni SRC members. Discussions about the future of the SRC Alumni Board took place, with presentations on how to broaden the network and offer support.

Further plans are to improve the policy and ensure collaboration with the Unit of Alumni Relations and Stakeholder Engagement. This collaboration plans to reach a wider pool of SRC alumni to strengthen the diversity of the Board and the Association of Old Rhodians.

ALUMNA BAGS TWO WOMEN ENTREPRENEURSHIP AWARDS

RHODES UNIVERSITY ALUMNA TULISA MONDLIWA, HAS RECEIVED GOVERNMENT RECOGNITION AND A BOOST FOR HER AFRIKARE BEAUTY PRODUCT BUSINESS.

ccording to the Eastern Cape Department of Rural Development and Agrarian Reform (DRDAR) Chief Director of Communications, Mvusiwekhaya Sicwetsha, the awards recognise top-performing women contributing to economic development and job creation through the agricultural sector.

Mondliwa has a BSc in Geography and Chemistry and a Postgraduate Diploma in Enterprise Management. She was the overall winner in the WEA and the agro-processing category and walked away with R60 000 in prize money.

The Afrikare founder says she could not have ventured into business without acquiring her Rhodes University qualifications.

She says a chemistry degree helped her understand which ingredients were clean and which were not in the beauty space. The Business School taught her operations management, sustainability, and awareness of climate change.

"These came in handy when I opened my Afrikare business," says Mondliwa.

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

HOW THE VISUAL IDENTITY TO **HELP CELEBRATE 120 YEARS OF EXCELLENCE WAS CREATED**

1. INITIAL EXPLORATIONS

Students from the Journalism and Media School senior design class created many exploratory designs to create a positive, affirming, simple, memorable logo that stands out in a crowded visual space and can be distinctly associated with Rhodes University.

2. WHITTLING DOWN

Most logos were rejected because they didn't meet the previous criteria and/or did not work together with the University branding. Four proposals were eventually chosen for presentation to the committee, two of which they selected for further tweaking.

3. PENULTIMATE SELECTION

The edited logos were presented to the committee for discussion, and one of those was chosen for presentation to the University for final approval.



The logo's design draws inspiration from the building with the clock tower and the life-cycle sculpture. The shape of the "1" in the "120" is drawn in part from the main administration building and the clock tower, while the open-top zero imitates the life-cycle sculpture, which describes an incomplete circle - representing Rhodes University as an ongoing project; one which is 120 years old but is still growing and developing.

It is also an open and inviting space. In the logo, we have used a shape that mimics the clock from the clock tower to complete (but not close) the number.

This shape can be interpreted as the clock symbolising the passing of time or the sun rising, which is universally understood as a hopeful sign.

Charles Breen, an esteemed alumnus of Rhodes University, obtained his PhD in Botany.



UNIVERSITY HAS HONOURED THE LATE SEK MQHAYI, ONE OF THE **GREATEST ISIXHOSA WRITERS IN HISTORY, AS THE INSTITUTION** CELEBRATES 200 YEARS OF THE WRITTEN ISIXHOSA LANGUAGE.

he author of the first extant novel in the Xhosa language, 'Ityala Lamawele,' is remembered for his stories, poems, and cultural interest.

isiXhosa is spoken as a first language by approximately 10 million people and a second language by 11 million. The book was first written down and published on the banks of the Tyhume River in Dikeni (Alice), Eastern Cape. SEK Mqhayi was one of the well-known authors who contributed to the growth of the language.

Deputy Minister of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs, Prince Zolile Burns-Ncamashe, says: "We are privileged that we could honour Mghayi because of his immense contribution to isiXhosa literature. He took so much pride in this language and wanted to make sure that the

language was preserved. Universities must take it upon themselves to do everything in their power to ensure that the legacy of Mkhayi lives on."

Mqhayi's writing ranged from isiXhosa dramas and novels to biographies and history. He was also a forerunner to democracy, a visionary with ideas for his country that only came to fruition 50 years after his death.

Vice-Chancellor Professor Sizwe Mabizela says: "It's so important that the institution ensures that isiXhosa is given the prestige it deserves by ensuring that our students take pride in their language."

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RESHAPING THE ROLE OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN UNIVERSITIES

A RECENT BOOK AWARD LECTURE WAS HELD IN HONOUR OF FORMER DEPUTY-VICE CHANCELLOR PROFESSOR CHRISSIE BOUGHEY AND THE DIRECTOR OF POSTGRADUATE STUDIES, PROFESSOR SIOUX MCKENNA, FOR THEIR COLLABORATIVE BOOK, "UNDERSTANDING HIGHER EDUCATION: ALTERNATIVE PERSPECTIVES".

Professor Boughey points out that over time, the purpose of contributing to developing a skilled workforce has become dominant to the extent that the other purposes are now mostly overlooked." Internationally recognised for her research on the aims and purposes of higher education, Professor McKenna shares that "over the years, the efficiency agenda meant that the importance of the academic development shifted from making students fit into making students complete in regulation time".

"We are all part of the system and continue to be, but with the engagement of critical pedagogy literature, we started to understand that universities are deeply political, and the university system serves to reproduce social inequalities in many devasting ways," Professor McKenna says.

> The book has been critically acclaimed and commended by several role players for this monumental research, describing the book as very insightful, informative, and an excellent analysis and critique of higher education.

Published in 2021, the book draws on the South African context, looking at the shifts in higher education worldwide in the last two decades.

The book responds to the calls for institutional transformation by arguing for a social account of teaching and learning that contests dominant understandings of students as "decontextualised learners" premised on the idea that university is a meritocracy.

Additionally, it argues for alternative ways of seeing higher education that can inform practising policy in South Africa and beyond.

In the journey to find alternative ways to understand higher education, Professor Boughey states: "We should be at the forefront of ideas about a new higher education system."

UNIVERSITY DISCOVER GAINS GLOBAL RECOGNITION

GROUND-BREAKING RESEARCH BY RHODES UNIVERSITY PHD GRADUATES, TAMRYN MARSBERG AND **MICHAEL JUKES HAS** LED TO THE PATENT **OF VIRAL-BASED PRODUCTS, MULTIMAX** AND CODLMAX, AS **ALTERNATIVES TO** CONVENTIONAL **CHEMICAL PESTICIDES ON CITRUS, APPLES,** AND LITCHI.

ne advantage of these products is that the pest is controlled without the knock-on environmental harm. The products help to control the codling moth and can be incorporated into control programmes alongside other products to mitigate resistance development. Farmers could use an expanded range of options to control pests and prevent resistance development as part of an integrated pest management strategy.

A global patent for the novel biopesticides is now complete, and work is underway to register and commercialise the products in various jurisdictions across the globe.

The genesis of the scientific odyssey goes back to 2013 when Tamryn, then a PhD student in the Zoology and Entomology department, began rearing the litchi moth, Cryptophlebia peltastica, for her research. This is when she discovered a novel baculovirus.

By coincidence, in July 2014, the department's Polish collaborators, Prof Bogusław Szewczyk and Dr Łukasz Rąbalski, were asked by the University's Centre for Biological Control (CBC) to help identify a separate novel virus that had been detected in false codling moth, T-haumatotibia leucotreta.

From 2015 to 2017, Michael Jukes from the Biochemistry and Microbiology department and Tamryn, Bogusław and Łukasz researched these novel viruses extensively. They discovered they were a single virus, the Alphabaculovirus Cryptophlebia peltastica Nucleopolyhedrovirus (CrpeNPV).

Years of inspired research led to the realisation that CrpeNPV had significant potential as an environmentally friendly biopesticide.

After the product was first patented, the team worked on patenting the virus discovery globally. Since then, the virus has been registered and commercialised. The first shipment of MultiMax and CodlMax was sent to South African farmers in South Africa in August 2023.

> "We are working with partners on the continent, North America and Europe to gain more registrations of the CrpeNPV," says SARChI Research Chair in Entomology and Director of the CBC at Rhodes University, Distinguished Professor Martin Hill.

or Sue, this was the beginning of a fascinating journey into the history of the house and its original owner and builder, an 1820 Settler leader, entrepreneur, politician, and, most famously of all, the man who shifted the Kowie River and created a harbour, the Honourable William Cock.

Sue began collecting artefacts, stories and documents about the house and William Cock, and in 2007 established the Richmond House Museum in the grounds of Richmond House.

Then, ably assisted and encouraged by fifth-generation William Cock, a descendant of local dairy farmer Ed Cock, she began the monumental task of researching the history of the house and the Cock family. This eminently readable and meticulously researched book is the result.





r Benita Bobo, an alumnus who called for the formation of the alumni chapters, shared a touching story on why forming alumni chapters would benefit the alumni and students.

She explains: "When I came to study at Rhodes University in 2010, I was a part of what is called 'the missing middle'. I was not poor enough to qualify for the National Student Financial Aid Scheme nor rich enough to study at Rhodes University.



"I came from a rural community of Ngqushwa who was raised by a single parent. I had to pay 50% of my fees and residence. It amounted to R50 000; my mother could only raise R15 000."

Dr Bobo says when she arrived at Rhodes University, it was the last day to pay the fee, and she could not register.

"The Vice-Chancellor's personal assistant asked what was happening. I explained, and she arranged for me to meet with the then Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Academic and Student Affairs, Professor Sizwe Mabizela [now Vice-Chancellor]," she adds.

She says Professor Mabizela asked her why she wanted to study at the institution. She explained that she would be the first person in her family to attend university.

"Professor Mabizela said it was unfair that I could not study because I do not have the means. He went

- to the fees office and told them that he would pay R10 000 for me. I still have the printout of the student account fees with the note 'Prof Mabizela said he would pay the R10 000'."
- 32-year-old Dr Bobo studied Bachelor of Social Sciences majoring in Psychology and Linguistics, honours in Psychology, Master's in Sociology and PhD in Psychology.
- Another alumnus, Lucky Mtolo, who studied Bachelor of Pharmacy, echoes the sentiments of Dr Bobo.
- "We are sending out a strong call to Rhodes University alumni to form vibrant alumni chapters," he says.

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PG Joubert

PG Joubert had a long-standing relationship with Rhodes University, first as a student when he completed his BA DPMW and later as a trustee.

During this time, PG developed a formidable business career for which he was named one of South Africa's top five business people of the Year by Sunday Times in 1991.

He was deputy chairman, chairman, CEO and director at some of South Africa's leading companies, including Nedcor, Afrox, Munich Reinsurance Company, Impala Platinum Holdings, Murray and Roberts, and Old Mutual, amongst others.

He later shared his business acumen, insight and wisdom as a trustee with the University of Cape Town.

PG also completed an an advanced management programme at Harvard in the early 1970s.



Emeritus Professor Cliff Moran completed his undergraduate degree in entomology from Rhodes University in 1958 and his PhD in 1967. He began lecturing in entomology in the Department of Zoology of Entomology in 1962 and was promoted to Professor in 1979. He served as Dean of the Faculty of Science between 1983 and 1985.

He joined the University of Cape Town (UCT) as Dean of Science in 1986, a position he held until his retirement in 1998. In 2005, Rhodes University awarded him an honorary doctorate for contributing to South African entomology.

He was awarded an A-rating from the South African National Research Foundation (NRF) from 1992-1996, was considered a leader in the biological control of invasive alien plants globally, and was often invited to give plenary papers on his research at international conferences.

After retirement, he received a Research Fellowship in the Department of Biological Sciences at UCT. He continued researching, reviewing and undertaking assessments for many local and overseas individuals, organisations and journals.



Founder of Pick 'n Pay and one of the University's esteemed honorary doctorate recipients. Dr Ackerman was conferred with a Doctor of Laws (LLD) (honoris causa) by Rhodes University in 1986 in recognition of his role as a foremost entrepreneur, a committed humanitarian and the immense contribution he made to business and society.

His association with the University extends over several touchpoints. In 1988, the Raymond Ackerman Chair in Business Administration in the Department of Management at Rhodes University was established.

The Raymond Ackerman Academy for Entrepreneurial Development has nurtured numerous emerging business proprietors.

The Ackerman Fund was established in 1988 to advance the academic project, including teaching and learning, research, networking (interinstitutionally and between the Department and leading members of commerce and industry), and international collaboration. Many staff members have benefitted, and numerous initiatives have been launched through the Fund's financial support.

Patrick joined Rhodes University on 1 April 1988 and retired on 31 July 2011 after 23 years of service. Patrick Phillips was part of the recruitment team headed up by Annette Orsmond. Together, they ran an efficient and effective recruitment and selection section for Rhodes University.

Patrick, or Paddy, as his close friends called him, served the University with distinction and had a very dry sense of humour. Colleagues remember him as professional, dependable and kind.

David Gain, a professor of Classics, joined Rhodes University in 1978 after completing his PhD in London and a short period at the University of the Witwatersrand.

His son, James, told me that David Gain has passed on following a battle with leukaemia. He retired early in 2000 but continued living in Makhanda (Grahamstown), where he actively participated in the bridge-playing and choral-singing communities. David was also an active participant in the Rhodes University alumni structures.

Ian Macdonald

Emeritus Professor of Philosophy Ian Macdonald came to Rhodes University as a student in Divinity in 1958. He was immediately confronted by the moral, social and political challenges of being a student in early 1960s South Africa.

lan's then best friend, Dunbar Moodie, at the time, recounts: "Macdonald, with typical intellectual consistency and integrity, eventually dropped theology and faith altogether". Ian stepped into student politics and became SRC President".

He completed an honours degree in Philosophy in 1962 and achieved a master of arts at the University of Kansas before returning to Rhodes as a lecturer in 1966. A senior lectureship followed in 1971, and a full professorship in 1984. He had a passion for rugby and played hooker, became a coach and eventually chairman of the Rhodes University Rugby Club.

He also served as the President of the Philosophical Society of Southern Africa and a member of the board of Philosophical Papers, the international journal published by the Rhodes Philosophy Department.



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
