## Good afternoon

As you have all heard, it all started with the Gender Action Forum, a sub-committee of Senate, writing a letter to our Vice-Chancellor, Dr Badat, requesting that the portraits in the Council chamber be removed and replaced by artwork "with thematic content which is pertinent to the core purposes of the institution". As is always said, the rest is history! We are deeply indebted to GenAct for their leadership and courage in raising, with due sensitivity, what was potentially a divisive or polarising issue.

When the Vice-Chancellor received the letter from GenAct, he did not simply dismiss the concerns therein raised as nothing more than frivolity of some misguided, rabble-rousing gender activists bent on destroying the rich and venerable history of Rhodes University. He, instead, accorded the contents of their letter all the seriousness it deserved and ensured that the whole of Rhodes University community had an opportunity to discuss and debate the issue of portraits. Thank you, Dr Badat, for your steady, exemplary and inspirational leadership.

The Faculty Boards, at the direction of their Deans, vigorously debated the proposal on portraits. Senate minutes record that three Faculties were in support of the proposal while the other three were opposed to it. Our hearty thanks and appreciation to our Deans of Faculty for providing strong and steadfast leadership, in general, and on this matter in particular.

Senate minutes also record that, instead of forcing a decision on the matter, Senate, in its wisdom, recommended that the discussion on portraits be deferred and picked up at the Institutional Culture Colloquium scheduled for October 2009. On that score, we wish to thank the Convenors of that Institutional Culture Colloquium, Prof Hendricks and Dr Fourie, where further vigorous and lively debate on the portraits was had.

We also wish to place on record our profound appreciation and deep gratitude to our University Senate and Council for the dignified manner in which they handled what was potentially an emotive matter.

We wish to convey our sincere thanks and appreciation to the Portraits Working Group, under the convenorship of Professor Brenda Schmahmann, for the inspired and fitting choice of the artwork that we have just unveiled. I have no doubt that Professor Schmahmann's considerable artistic insights, unrivalled perfectionist nature and her meticulous attention to detail would not have allowed her to settle for anything less. Thank you, Brenda and your team for a job well done.
