Tilsetso Nhlapo is a vibrant, committed and knowledgeable student and leader. Her community engagement journey has been firmly rooted in the BuddingQ early Literacy Programme since 2020 where she has become valuable to all stakeholders and her "belief in the power of collective action and the importance of practising social responsibility" has been reinforced constantly.

She joined the programme in 2020 and stood out amongst 120 volunteers for her deep and thoughtful

engagement with the accredited online short course that all volunteers in the programme undertake. Since 2021 she has been a student leader in the programme serving at 4 different local primary schools. In her role as a leader she has been nurturing of new volunteers (in our view - a master trainer) and a great mentor to new leaders in the programme. She is gentle in her interactions with learners and respectful with teachers ensuring that all stakeholders are fully engaged and acknowledged.

This year, she has ramped up her leadership and commitment to social change significantly. She was selected to travel to Rwanda on a Service Learning exchange trip, she has presented in the International Rhodes University Community Engagement conference and she is currently co-authoring a paper on the role of RU Engaged citizenry programmes in building democracy. This is remarkable at the Honours level!

Similarly, she has been on the organising committee of a major community imbizo which is entirely student-led (right from funding to execution). She has been innovative and resourceful about how to guide and support her peers to the successful and professional execution of this large-scale event.

Beyond this, Tiisetso is an active member of our community – a leader in the Law Society at Rhodes University (2022) and tutor in the Psychology department (2021-2023).

Tiisetso works diligently to be the change she wants to see in the world. She serves as an inspiration to our whole community to lean into the complexity of community

Takudzwa Makuwa

Takudzwa Makuwa, fondly known to all of us as Boots, has an extensive community engagement CV. His journey began in 2020 as a BuddingQ volunteer and CE Rep in Joe Slovo House. Since then, he has occupied several CE leadership positions, most notably in the BuddingQ Early Literacy Programme.

Having been selected for this award in 2023, this year we highlight how he has elevated his commitment to CE. This year has been a bumper year for him. Among his many accolades and achievements in 2024, he was selected as 1 of 6 South African students to



participate in a Transdisciplinary International Learning Laboratory experience in Canada; he's been named as one of Africa's Top 50 Most Impactful Young Leaders (which unlocked significant seed funding from Global Changemakers to host a student-led evaluation of BuddingQ); and he was a participant in the international Geneva Challenge essay competition.

So in celebration of his achievement we want to highlight who Boots is to us. We acknowledge him for three unique traits that the selection panel felt elevated his CE journey:

First, his demonstration of how to work in the nexus of CE and research. This year, Takudzwa has undertaken the co-authorship of two research papers with staff and students at RUCE. These papers focus on participatory democracy and personal journeys of volunteerism and youth empowerment – clearly influenced by years of experience in community projects.

Second, is his advocacy for CE. He is a well-known spokesperson for CE locally and nationally – having presented on radio, conferences and serving as a support for many student groups at Rhodes. He works closely with several student societies to guide their CE practices. This requires a deep understanding of CE principles and collaboration. He also maintains his own VERY active and engaging social media which often highlights his own and other CE work in Makhanda and sheds light on many social injustices in our society.

And finally, his ability to collaborate and rally groups together. He never does anything alone – he embodies a mature sense of servant leadership and understanding of what it means to work with people. Boots serves as a mentor to fellow leaders in the BuddingQ programme and in the residence system. His mentorship has arguably been influential in attracting more men to our early learning programmes and recruiting student volunteers.

Takudzwa has been a great ambassador and community convenor for RUCE and the larger Rhodes community this year. We applaud his momentum and quantum of community engagement!

Nduduzo Mvundla



Nduduzo has shown great commitment to his CE partner Vul'indlela. He started volunteering as a tutor and mentor in 2022. In 2023, he became a Student Leader in the programme, a role he continues to hold with passion and dedication.

Res organised a Kiddie Play Session and Funny Money Drive which exemplifies their ability to align efforts with community needs. These activities resulted in sustainable positive changes - the SPCA built new structures for their dogs and play is vital for children's growth.

STUDENT RESEARCHER OF THE YEAR – Lian May



Lian May has been awarded the CE Student Researcher of the Year award for his outstanding contributions to research in Political and International Studies. His charismatic personality and deep commitment to his community in Makhanda are evident in his Masters dissertation, which focuses on the often-overlooked politics of local identities, particularly the Coloured community of Makhanda.

Lian's research aims to challenge harmful stereotypes by providing a platform for community members to share their own stories, emphasising their agency and contributions. His innovative approach involved conducting interviews in multiple languages and fostering trusting relationships, which even led to community members inviting him into their homes for the interviews. This level of engagement reflects the significant impact he has made, as evidenced by participants' willingness to re-interview after a technological mishap.

Lian is the most deserving candidate for this award due to his dedication to creating sustainable knowledge within his community and his plans to continue this important dialogue, potentially leading to further research opportunities. His role as a co-researcher in broader community engagement projects further amplifies his influence and commitment to transformative practices in academia.

CLUBS AND SOCIETIES

Rhodes University Toastmasters Club

Two years ago, Rhodes University **Toastmasters** with Club partnered Nombulelo Senior Secondarv School to run sessions on public speakina, covering everything from body language and voice projection to speech



writing. Last year, the student society expanded the programme to include four more schools - Khutliso Daniels, Nathaniel Nyaluza, Ntsika Senior Secondary Schools and Mary Waters High School. Both years, the Club ended the year by putting together a Public Speaking Competition, now an annual event.

By 2024, Toastmasters had grown their Community Engagement to another level. This year, the programme welcomed two more schools - Victoria Girls' High School and P.J. Olivier - to the roster. The 3rd Annual Rhodes University Toastmasters Finale is scheduled for later this month (September 2024).

Rhodes University Toastmasters Club has displayed initiative, sustainability and innovation this year. The Society's strong leadership, understanding of community engagement principles, and commitment to inclusivity has been impactful in fostering communication skills in English, isiXhosa, and Afrikaans among Makhanda youth.

Rhodes Kings and Queens Chess Club

The Rhodes Kings and Queens Chess Club had an impactful year inspiring a love and passion for Chess. Early this year, the Club hosted the Sarah Baartman Chess Trials here at Rhodes University, in partnership with Sewelo Maths and Chess



Community Youth Academy (SEMCCYA). The organisations formulated a team that would represent the Eastern Cape province in the provincials.

CLUBS AND SOCIETIES

They also donated chess books and a chess set to the Duna Library and held community games in partnership with Amazwi South African Museum of Literature. The club also facilitated the Makhanda Schools Chess Tournament which was held at Kingswood College in July 2024.

The Club's efforts this year have been continuous - they hosted weekly Blitz Chess Tournaments which were open to interested chess players, and their educational engagements included weekly chess coaching at Grahamstown Primary School. The Kings and Queens also participated in the Disability Week programme in September.

These initiatives reflect the Rhodes Kings and Queens Chess Club's commitment to promoting chess, inclusivity and community engagement.

Rhodes Shotokan Karate Club



The Rhodes Shotokan Karate Club has demonstrated strong community involvement through various initiatives this year. The Club offered weekly Karate, self-defence, and obedience classes to Grade 8 and 9 pupils at Diocesan School for Girls, Kingswood College, and the Eluxolweni Child and Youth Care Centre.

Shotokan Karate Club formed a partnership with the SPCA Makhanda. They volunteered at the SPCA's Mandela Open Day and put together the Funny Money Drive which raised over R2200 towards the SPCA's Brick 'n Bark Project. ADC's support for small businesses through the Rhodes University Masakhe Enterprise and Supplier Development programme, has guided local entrepreneurs, towards achieving sustainability and contributing to the economic vitality of the town.

Talking Technology to Power

Talking Technology to Power, a programme under the Social Employment Fund Initiative, is made up of a group of young people of Makhanda, who have formed sustainable partnerships with various



organisations in Makhanda, and has consistently demonstrated an exceptional commitment to community engagement to revitalise the education space in

Talking Technology to Power has demonstrated a remarkable ability to collaborate with various community organisations. The Club extended the reach and impact of the #SDcardMakhanda campaign, which makes learning materials accessible through cell phone memory cards. The group has maintained a strong partnership with Vul'indlela and has an ongoing collaboration with the Lebone Centre, where SD cards loaded with educational content in three local languages are being prepared for young children in 50 families.

The SD card project, which provided vital educational resources to Grade 9 to 12 learners, has been a game-changer for learners facing the challenges of limited access to study materials. By facilitating access to high-quality, CAPS-aligned educational content, The Talking Technology to Power group has directly contributed to improving educational outcomes for these students, as evidenced by the testimonies of learners who have benefited from these resources.



Meal After School

Meal After School was designed to support local school children by providing them with essential after-school services. The programme ensures that learners receive nutritious meals to combat hunger and improve focus. The programme also helps bridge the educational gap by offering homework assistance, reading practice, and personalised tutoring sessions. In addition to meals, the children receive tutoring assistance in various

subjects, particularly in reading and literacy. The initiative aims to create a safe, supportive environment where learners can develop academically and socially outside of regular school hours.

The Meal After School Program has significantly impacted the local community by addressing key issues such as hunger, education, and child welfare. By providing meals, tutoring and mentorship to the learners, Meal After School has contributed to improving the well-being of many children in Makhanda, helping them focus better in school, achieve academic success, and feel supported in a nurturing environment.

This programme assists in combating food insecurity in Makhanda, but also improves literacy and educational outcomes, which can have long-term positive effects on the community.

2023 VC'S DISTINGUISHED COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AWARD WINNER

Dr Jessica Cockburn

For the Vice-Chancellor's Distinguished Award for Community Engagement



The Vice-Chancellor's Distinguished Community Engagement Award is a prestigious and competitive annual award, which recognises academics who have successfully established meaningful and sustainable partnerships between members of the University and community partners in the areas of teaching, learning and research to contribute to sustainable human and community development. Such individuals have demonstrated to a panel of peers that their contribution to community engagement is truly distinguished and worthy of the Vice-Chancellor's award.

I am honoured to present Dr Jessica Cockburn for the 2023 Distinguished Vice-Chancellor's Community Engagement Award.

Jessica is a senior lecturer in the Department of Environmental Science, in the Faculty of Science. She earnestly believes in and enthusiastically contributes to the idea that we are caretakers and not conquerors of the natural world. Dr Cockburn embodies the ethos of community engagement through her wide and deep-ranging efforts to bring together a multitude of stakeholders in the service of both social and environmental sustainability and justice.

Through various integrated engaged teaching and research activities, Dr Cockburn has pioneered a transdisciplinary and holistic approach to community engagement, which is rich and inspiring. She has applied teaching, learning and research resources to meet community needs to specifically confront the pressing social-ecological sustainability crises the community faces. These initiatives have thus promoted university social responsibility. Her transdisciplinary and integrated methodologies, what she describes as organic processes of "weaving engagement into teaching and research", have been developmental and participatory, and the partnerships built with River Rescue, the community around the Tsitsa River catchment and more recently the team at Assegai Trails are reciprocal and collaborative.

Implementation of the projects has entailed joint planning, innovative monitoring and evaluation, and efficient utilisation of resources. As a result, the local natural environment, community partners, as well as students and staff

have benefited. Balancing the advancement of teaching and research with community development with remarkable synergy, Dr Cockburn is recognised by her students, colleagues and community partners as deeply aware of the importance of context, connections and care, and these ideas are core to her personal philosophy as an academic.

Dr Cockburn began as a volunteer at River Rescue, a small, local volunteerbased organisation, which started in Makhanda in early 2020 with the mission to clean the rivers in the city of Makhanda. The aim of River Rescue is to restore the link between our rivers and our people. Dr Cockburn now serves as a facilitator, fostering a learning partnership between River Rescue and the Department of Environmental Science. Environmental Science Honours students participate as volunteers in the River Rescue clean up effort, where they bring their knowledge of environmental science into discussions and planning sessions for River Rescue activities. During these engagements, students develop their own specific projects to benefit River Rescue, such as social media campaigns, mapping activities, and educational outreach activities. In this way, students share their knowledge and enthusiasm with the River Rescue community, and they are, in turn, enriched by gaining knowledge from the community partners of the local context and challenges related to water and waste management. This service learning project involves staff members from the Department of Environmental Science, and all of the Honours students.

It constributes to the transformation of the way in which local rivers are managed and cared for; the way in which local residents interact with and relate to the river; the relationships between the university and the local community and physical environment; students at a personal level in terms of personal growth, skills and knowledge beyond what they get in a formal classroom setting. Reflective practice is embedded as a key aspect of the course. Students reflect with facilitators in regular meetings, and in regular reflection reports, which they submit for assessment. The project includes reflective meetings with River Rescue team members, and rich collaborative discussions with community members. In these discussions and reflections, community partners showcase the value of other forms of knowledge, beyond the academic, in addressing sustainability issues, something which is core to the Environmental Science curriculum, but can be difficult for students to grasp in a world where science is still treated as a far superior form of knowledge.

In the words of one of her community partners, Helen Holleman:

"The hands-on exposure of Honours students to the realities of the local watercourses and the lives of the people who live along them makes real the theory of systems thinking and often compels re-assessment of one's understanding and assumptions.

Working side by side with members of the community, listening to their problems,

seeing the daily reality of the difficulties they contend with provides life-lessons that no theory can provide.... "Jess' involvement with the River Rescue programme has been profoundly beneficial in strengthening links between the University and community and in transforming the direction of the programme; it has brought direct educational (and practical) benefits to both the community and the Honours students, and has introduced new, reflective ways of thinking about the links between people and their environment."

The River Rescue team were honoured for their critical role in this co-learning partnership by receiving the Rhodes University Community Engagement Partner of the Year Award in 2023.

When she reflects on the partnership and how it has shaped her work as an engaged teacher in the university, Dr Cockburn puts the warm, respectful, open relationship she has with the River Rescue team at the centre of the story, and she expresses deep appreciation for the work that Helen Hollemann, Elizabeth Davies, Ntombomzi Monakali, Margaret Wolff, the late Preven Chetty, Nosi Mtati and many others, including her students, have done to enable these meaningful outcomes for so many people.

Jessica believes that a community engagement award should not be awarded solely to an individual. She says: "When I stand on that stage to accept the award I want the audience to know that I am standing there not as an individual winner but as someone helping to shine the spotlight on the important, heartfelt and difficult work we have done in collaboration". Complementing this teaching initiative is Dr Cockburn's engaged research, which focuses on landscapes, linkages, and learning, which ultimately aims to conserve the watercourses of Makhanda and the broader landscapes of the Eastern Cape.

Dr Cockburn's endeavours as an engaged researcher are best described through an account of the Tsitsa Project, a large collaborative project involving numerous stakeholders, including researchers, local community members, natural resource managers, policy-makers, local NGOs and others, collectively working towards more sustainable landscape management and rural livelihood development in the Tsitsa River catchment. She acknowledges and celebrates the work and commitment of her colleagues Nosiseko Mtati, Margaret Wolff, Tally Palmer, Eureta Rosenberg, Harry Biggs, Monde Ntshudu, and many others who made this project the success that it was.

It is this crossing of disciplinary, methodological, social and physical borders, and the concomitant appreciation of interconnections and the foregrounding of relationships that makes Dr Cockburn a worthy recipient of the 2023 Vice-Chancellor's Distinguished Award for Community Engagement.

Rhodes University Community Engagement (RUCE) 2024 Highlights

The Rhodes University vision is 'to be foremost in the generation and advancement of locally responsive and globally engaged knowledge that seeks to create a just and sustainable society.' The mission states that through transformative, rigorous scholarship and research, the university aims to advance human understanding and wisdom, cultivate graduates who are caring and engaged citizens, responsible, courageous and ethical leaders and to drive equitable and inclusive development through mutually beneficial partnerships. Through its nexus with teaching and research, community engagement enables and promotes this vision and mission with strategic intent.

This report shares the highlights of 2024 providing evidence of the contribution and impact of CE on community development.

EXTERNAL DONOR PARTNERSHIPS

Community engagement is an unfunded national mandate. Donor partners, therefore, play a crucial role in stepping in to fund this important work. We are deeply indebted for their contribution to community engagement as it not only has impact on the community in which we live but also contributes to the repositioning and transformation of Rhodes University. In 2024, we have again enjoyed the financial and moral support of donor partners, Ms Zanele Twala and the Standard Bank Tutuwa Community Foundation, Ms Vuyo Mwase from the Energy Mobility Education Trust, Mr Paul Smith from the Kagiso Fund, Ms Barbara Proudfoot from the KAVOD Trust and Mr John Williams from GBS Local Bank for being so meaningfully committed to the transformation of the Makhanda community.

MAKHANDA CITY WIDE INTERVENTIONS (towards an Integrated Social Development Model)

As we work collectively to revitalise the city of Makhanda, we do so in an integrated manner leading and participating in interventions that accelerate education,

health and economic development simultaneously. The development of knowledge and models in these sectors are important so that we are able share practices and have a broader societal influence.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The two key drivers in this area are the newly established Masakhe Programme and the Social Innovation Hub located at RUCE.

The Masakhe Social Enterprise Development (SED) Programme, focusing on Enterprise and Supplier Development was established in January 2023. This is a partnership between the Finance and Procurement Office, Business School, RUCE and community partner, the Assumption Development Centre (ADC). In 2024, the following highlights are noted:

- Showcase Event held at RU on the 31 July 2024
- Enterprise Development Course for 12 SMME's offered by Prof Tshidi Mohapela (Business School)
- Certificate in Business Development Studies for 12 Businesses offered by Tabang Moleko (Business School)
- Financial Literacy Course for Artists by the Black Power Station (in partnership with National Arts Festival)
- IT Equipment for Assumption Development Centre
- Investment of equipment and infrastructure into the following businesses: Glenda's Sewing Centre, Masi Gagayi's Upholstery Business and Sis'Dambisa's Laundry.
- Purchase, branding and equipping of 2 Food Trailers to be situated on the Rhodes University campus, owned by two local entrepreneurs.
- Twelve designed and installed Framed Chromadek Signs on poles for Businesses.
- 14 Businesses to benefit from Branding packages to the value of R5,000 each.

The Social Innovation HUB (SIH), which was established at RUCE to contribute to social innovation, had a successful year, and the highlights are as follows:

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- Sixty-five participants have received certificates from the SIH accredited short courses this year completing the Basic Computer Literacy and Digital Storytelling for Social Innovation.
- Digital Storytelling short courses have been run with over ninety students in curriculum-bearing courses this year from Social Psychology, Community Psychology and Journalism and Media Studies.
- The Digital Storytelling curriculum is part of a Collection of Interactive Digital Narrative syllabi, which will be published by Carnegie Mellon University Press. A book chapter on Teaching courses run at Rhodes University has been published by Rowman and Littlefield.
- Many community partners visit the HUB regularly. The Workspace has been a vibrant hub of activity with the Talking Technology to Power Media Club and Vulindlela using the facilities for the #SDCardMakhanda campaign. The Hub has been helping community partners and visitors with writing business plans, marketing projects and creating CVs.
- Six workshops on digital tools and enterprise related skills were facilitated for staff, students and community.
- The Digital Resource Centre has supported seventy participants with basic technologies for events, planning and implementing projects.

HEALTH DEVELOPMENT

A long-standing partnership between Rhodes University and the District Health Department was boosted with the renovation of the new Extension building at the Joza Clinic.

- This R800,000 project was funded through the RU Masakhe programme and has effectively doubled the space for health services to take place at the Joza Clinic.
- Rhodes researchers and lecturers from various departments, including Psychology, Pharmacy, Information Systems and HKE are involved in service learning, engaged research and engaged citizenry (volunteer) programmes. Pharmacy have placed students in the Clinics, Information Systems implementing electronic systems and HKE is running an extensive programme with over 130 top athletes in Joza and has various wellness interventions at school level.

- The Psychology Department has established a permanent Counselling facility at the Assumption Development Centre offering daily free counselling services for learners and their families. The training Psychologists also offer preventative workshops in the schools as well as career guidance.
- HKE Department is integrating community engagement into teaching and research at all levels, creating opportunities for their students to apply their knowledge outside the academe. Undergraduates are involved in 3 Primary Schools (George Dickerson, Grahamstown Primary and St Marys Primary) in various physical literacy and sports coaching activities. They are working in the High-Performance Centre in Joza, at the post-graduate level, with 130 selected athletes.
- The Warriors Cricket Development Programme, a multi stakeholder partnership between RUCE, HKE, Kingswood College, the Gary Kristen Foundation, Grahamstown Primary School, St Mary's Primary and George Dickerson continues to do well, creating employment for unemployed youth and opportunities for learners in the school.

EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT

- The matric pass rate has increased from 62% in 2015 to 80% in 2023.
- The number of Matric Bachelor passes produced has increased from 179 in 2015 to 307 in 2023.
- The school drop-out rate has dropped by 20%.
- Enabling local disadvantaged students to gain access to Rhodes: The number of local disadvantaged students who have gained access to Rhodes University has increased from 11 in 2012 to over 160 in 2023.
- 70 Student Leaders selected from the 7 Engaged Citizenry Programmes travelled to Hogsback on the 13/14 April for the annual Student Leader Bootcamp. This highly successful event has now become a highlight on the RUCE calendar.

The VC's Education Programme is a multi-stakeholder initiative with interventions from ECD through to post schooling, working to keep learners

in the system through various interventions. The value of this pathway is evidenced in the Grade 12 results. RUCE co-ordinates 7 programmes working with volunteers to contribute to this pathway. Some brief highlights of each are mentioned below.

Nine Tenths Matric Mentoring Programme (Grade 12's)

- A vibrant partnership with GADRA education in its ninth year of existence continues to impact and delight at so many levels.
- In 2024, five schools participated in the project with the following number of learners: Ntsika-84, Mary Waters-28, Nombulelo-56, PJ Olivier-28 and Kutliso Daniels-28 making the of 224 learners.
- The above learners are mentored by 114 well trained RU volunteer mentors and fifteen student leaders.
- June results were very encouraging with 181 Bachelor passes, up from 130 in their November marks last year. This bodes well for the final examination.
- In 2024, 51 learners were welcomed from last year's cohort to Rhodes University as first year students from this programme.
- We were delighted when thirty-four former learners from the programme graduated with Bachelors and postgraduate degrees in the April 2024 graduation.

Vulindlela Parent Engagement Programme

- The Vulindlela Programme targets RU Support Staff and their school-going children in Grades 9 to 12. In 2024, the programme introduced Homework Clubs to Grade 9 learners, which grew the programme numbers exponentially and introduced academic support in the Senior phase.
- In 2024, the Vulindlela programme has a total number of sixty-four parents and eighty-two learners. The learners come from seven local High Schools.
- Twenty-one (21) active student volunteers, and six student leaders attended Saturday sessions at the Faculty of Education buildings.
- There are two service-learning courses embedded in the Vulindlela programme. The first is a partnership between twenty-three third year

School of Journalism and Media Studies (JMS) students, the Social Employment Fund (Talking Technology into Power) group, and six no-fee High Schools in Makhanda. This resulted in 714 SD cards being loaded with carefully selected content and distributed to learners in no fee schools. JMS students prepared and published articles on the project.

• A second service-learning course is the Financial Life Skills course, offered to the Parents of the Vulindlela Programme over five weeks. This course is linked to the Rhodes University Management Department (Management Honours students) and is provided in partnership with the GBS Mutual Bank.

High School Tutoring Programme

- The programme collaborated with six community partner organisations-Inkululeko, Ikamva Youth, Sophumelela, PJ Olivier High School, Khanya Maths and Science and GADRA Education, engaging 117 university students in tutoring and mentoring learners from Grades 8-12 across a variety of subjects.
- The Faculty of Education offered an accredited short course training for the 117 registered students which includes eight student leaders.

BuddingQ Literacy Programme for Gr R

- 118 RUCE volunteers work across nine schools, and our partner organisations who have adopted the program work with Kingswood College, St Mary's DCC, Amakhala Foundation (Sidbury School) Lebone and Holy Cross School.
- 2024 marks the 5-year anniversary of the programme. To celebrate this milestone a student led IMBIZO was held in September to evaluate the programme with stakeholders.
- Student leader, Takudzwa Makuwa, with assistance from RUCE applied for and was awarded funding from a global initiative, Global Changemakers to organise and host the Imbizo as well as a BuddingQ Bootcamp for Student Leaders.

Project Read

- Project Read is led by the Lebone Centre, and it targets the Grade 1 literacy development. It follows on from the Budding Q work done in Grade R in schools. This programme places a strong emphasis on developing conventional literacy abilities in line with the Science of Reading research.
- The programme reaches eight schools with twenty dedicated Rhodes mentors working at CM Vellem and Ntaba Maria supporting grade 1 and the St Mary's Grade R learners. The Education Faculty's second year Teaching Practicum students are supporting Good Shepherd and Makana Primary, and Lebone interns are involved with George Dickerson and Grahamstown Primary.

CERCO (Community Engagement Reading Club Orientation)

- CERCO follows on from Project Read. It is designed and led by Professor Sam Naidu from the Literary Studies in the English Language Department in partnership with RUCE.
- This year the programme worked with five student leaders and fourteen dedicated student volunteers. Participating schools are CM Vellem, Good Shepherd, and Oatlands Primary, Fikizolo. Lebone oversees two more clubs at Grahamstown Primary and George Dickerson.

INFUSED MODEL OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The model Rhodes University has chosen to implement for community engagement is the 'infused model'. To this end we have built partnerships across the University, ensuring community engagement is embedded not only in Academic Departments but also in the Support Departments. We have successfully built partnerships with the Residence/Hall System, the SRC Societies and Sports Clubs, through the initiatives below.

Community Engagement Orientation (CEO) for 1st Years

 RUCE celebrates a successful partnership with the Division of Student Services and Development (DSSD). Working closely with Residences, RUCE trained the community engagement representatives to facilitate five sessions to the first-year group, thereby introducing them to community engagement. First year students achieved 828 certificates of attendance and 172 certificates of competence.

- The DSSD funded the second element of the programme, the bus trip into Makhanda. Community engagement representatives were trained as tour guides and they shared stories around the history of Makhanda.
- This CEO programme really gave the SRC Cllr and her community engagement Residence representatives, a platform to innovatively grow and establish themselves as leaders.

The Siyakhana@Makhanda (S@M) Programme

- This is a project targeting Residences partnered with 15 ECD sites and led by the 52 SRC community engagement representatives in the Residence System.
- Initiatives this year included the establishment of reading clubs, promotion of literacy, launching recycling programmes, gardening, painting and renovating sites, health campaigns, nutrition and disease prevention amongst other successful initiatives.

Societies and Sport Clubs

 Twelve active societies have been instrumental in coordinating useful projects in collaboration with carefully selected community partners. Examples include cultural festivals, health and wellness workshops, educational programmes and mentoring.

The integration of Community Engagement into Departmental Teaching and Research has been the key focus and good progress has been made.

ENGAGED RESEARCH

 RUCE hosted the International Community Engagement Conference at the Monument building on 14th to 16th May. 22 South African Universities and 7 International Universities attended the conference. International Universities included the Open University of Tanzania (Tanzania), Tangaza University College (Kenya), Universidad de la Republica (Uruguay), University of Kusibi (Uganda), Oxford University (UK), Stanton University (USA) and Cornell University (USA). Other important stakeholders included USAf, NRF, HSRC and the Carnegie Classifications Foundation of HE (USA). The Conference also attracted 4 Schools and 9 NPO's. A total of 160 delegates attended the Conference.

- The African Journal of Higher Education Community Engagement (AJHECE) is gaining much interest in the sector. There is sufficient interest from the recent Conference hosted by RUCE for two publications and a book. The second issue will be published in November 2024 and the third in April 2025.
- The UNESCO Knowledge for Change (K4C) Consortium is an integral part of the RU Engaged Research Programme. The consortium embodies the University's commitment to collaboration and leveraging knowledge as a catalyst for positive societal change. Rhodes University is one of 22 UNESCO Knowledge for Change (K4C) hubs that have been established in sixteen countries as part of an International UNESCO Consortium. In 2024, RUCE contributed to the establishment of a Regional HUB located at GULU University in Uganda. Two new Universities are in the process of joining the Southern section of the K4C Hub located at RUCE, namely Nelson Mandela University and Eduvos.
- Two short courses in Community Based Participatory Research were offered this year reaching lecturers in Psychology, Centre for Critical Studies in Sexualities and Reproduction, School of Languages and Literatures, Biochemistry, Microbiology and Bioinformatics, University of Pretoria, Rhodes Business School, Rhodes Library and Community Engagement.
- RUCE was delighted to honour Dr Jessica Cockburn from the Department of Environmental Science, Faculty of Science, the prestigious 2023 Vice Chancellors Distinguished Community Engagement Award for her efforts to bring together a multitude of stakeholders in the service of both social and environmental sustainability and justice. Through various integrated engaged teaching and research activities, Dr Cockburn has pioneered a transdisciplinary and holistic approach to community engagement, which is rich and inspiring.

RUCE TRAVEL

- Dr Margie Maistry presented at the International Social Work Conference in India in February.
- Nosi Nkwinti, Anna Talbot, Thandie Nqowana attended the Pan African Summit in Johannesburg in April. Anna Kinsler, Thandi Matyobeni and Kristena Reddy presented at the CE Conference in May.
- Di Hornby and Dr Margie Maistry presented at the Higher Education Close Up Conference in July at Rhodes University.
- In October, Thandi Nqowana, Dr Gamu Chakona, Kristena Reddy and Nosi Nkwinti are presenting at the Higher Education, Teaching and Learning Conference at NMU in Gqeberha.
- Dr Oosthuizen was invited to serve on a panel discussing the Future of Higher Education in Africa at a UNESCO-African Union convened event taking place at the African Union Headquarters in September 2024.
- Di Hornby will be presenting on Universities as Anchor Institutions at the International Association on Research in Service-Learning and Community Engagement (IARSLCE) which is to be held at the University of San Diego, California, USA in October.
- In November, Dr Joana Bezerra will be presenting at the 8th Global Symposium on Health Systems Research in Nagasaki, Japan.

TEACHING AND LEARNING

RUCE is delighted to have received correspondence from SAQA that the Post Graduate Diploma in Higher Education Community Engagement, NQF level 8 has been accredited.

The accredited online short course, titled Community Based Service Learning: What-Why-Where was offered twice at Rhodes University and once at the Vaal University of Technology.

The University has made available an amount of R525,000 000 annually for the support of service-learning programmes, making this a very enabling space for growth.

RUCE has offered ten accredited short courses this year, these short courses form the theoretical basis of all the Engaged Citizenry (Volunteer) Programmes.

Much has been achieved to strengthen the community engagement structures at Departmental level. We are very pleased that CE Faculty Reps are now able to report to Deputy Deans. Our Community Engagement Faculty Representatives have been supportive this year and worked hard to ensure community engagement is embedded in the Faculty and reports are written and presented at Faculty Board Meetings. A special thanks to the following representatives: Humanities-Prof Sam Naidu, Science – Prof Lizanne Raubenheimer, Education – Ms Angi Jones, Law – Adv Shuaib Rahim, Pharmacy – Farisai Chiwanza and Dr Xolile Antoni from Commerce.

Sincere thanks to the VC, Professor Sizwe Mabizela, DVC's Prof Mabokang Monnapula-Mapesela and Dr Kwezi Mzilikazi as well as Senior Management and other Colleagues who have played key roles to build the community engagement space. We know we are privileged to have an executive leadership and staff that truly understands the strategic value of community engagement in higher education.
