Rhodes University Mountain Club

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The Mountain Club has been a finalist in the category of CE club of the year several times in previous years, so it would take a huge effort to prove their worth as a finalist in this category again. The Mountain Club of 2020 truly, rose to this challenge in very difficult times.

Despite the challenges that 2020 posed, the club has critically and innovatively positioned CE as a core function of their club, even more so during the pandemic. CE is embedded as one of the clubs 'offerings' that adds value to their members' experience and creates a more inclusive atmosphere to the club. Similarly, their constitution has changed to ensure that a CE Rep must have RUCE recognized CE experiences and two CE reps were elected onto the committee this year. These two CE Reps demonstrated a wealth of knowledge and commitment and were thoroughly supported by their committee.

The Mountain Club has had a sustained relationship with the Grahamstown Scout Group for 6 years. The COVID-19 pandemic proved no challenge to this relationship! Prior to lockdown, the club hosted their first overnight hike with over 26 teenage [boy] scouts. This event was the most well attended CE club event the club has ever hosted.

During the lockdown, they focused on community building amongst their own club members, who were scattered around the country. A three-week, virtual challenge encouraged members in teams to get healthy and outdoors and share their experiences. The various outdoor challenges were based on the Sustainable Development Goals and the ultimate team prize was a donation to a Makhanda COVID relief cause, in which food packages were donated to ECD centers who took a significant knock during the lockdown.

With the close relationships volunteers formed with the scouts, this year couldn't end without a final send off and so the committee organized a local (COVID-safe) climbing event at Craig Doone.

COMMUNITY PARTNER OF THE YEAR

GADRA Education

The complexities of this year have caused all of us to re-think education. For GADRA this has meant a significant change to the virtual world. The current digital divide in our country has caused programme leaders to think innovatively about the implementation of their programmes, by using low-cost media and continuous volunteer development. The GADRA team has been vocal during lockdown, negotiating, reinventing and actively finding alternative ways to rescue the schooling year for many. They have worked tirelessly and creatively to keep their programmes going and servicing our community in the face of many adverse challenges that this year brought.

A credit to the support and persistence of the organisation this year is the 30 (and rising) students who have already applied to Rhodes; some of whom are already provisionally accepted. And the number of Bachelor level passes in the Nine Tenths Mentoring programme that have increased to 70 this year from 40 at the start of the year.

GADRA's success must be owed to the warmth of their relationships with pupils and students, their firm focus on social justice and their commitment to Community-University partnerships. It is apt then to end this citation with an excerpt from the award nomination made by a Rhodes student, "Gadra made sure that mentors were able to reach their mentees and wanted to make sure that everyone is being accommodated and not to be left out. Hence Gadra's resilience and courage to continue, and work during the pandemic is one of the many reasons that I have nominated Gadra.'

STUDENT RESEARCHER OF THE YEAR

Nosiseko Mtati

Nosiseko Mtati is conducting her MEd research part-time, her second masters, while she is also the Catchment Co-ordinator of the Tsitsa Project. In this dual role, she not only conducts community engaged research to build new knowledge, but also actively practices leadership in community engagement through her role as Catchment Co-ordinator.

The two-fold overall aim of the MEd study is: 1) to inform the training and management of environmental monitors in this NRM programme, and 2) to inform environmental monitoring programmes in general, as potentially important learning opportunities for all stakeholders involved. Her research informs her own practice, and through it she promotes principles of good community engagement practice in the Tsitsa Project and in wider NRM programmes funded and supported by DEFF across the country.

Ms. Mtati has demonstrated a deep sense of commitment, humility and care in her work with the communities in the Tsitsa river catchment. Her academic research as a young scholar is innovative, relevant and builds much-needed knowledge to support community engagement in the context of natural resource management. She is therefore a deserving candidate for Finalist of the Student Researcher of the Year Award in Community Engagement.

Samridhi Sharma

Samridhi Sharma has been involved in community-engaged research for Health Promotion since 2014 as part of her BPharm degree up until her current PhD degree. This includes the development of health information leaflets, posters, role plays, and games on diabetes, alcohol use, and AMR for Rhodes University support staff as well as for schools in Makhanda. As part of her fourth year BPharm research project, Samridhi developed three health information leaflets on 'alcohol abuse' with Rhodes University Support Staff and Peer Educators. Samridhi's PhD research expanded from the public sector healthcare facilities to the Rhodes University Peer Educators when she upgraded from her MPharm to PhD, further

developing their work rapport. Samridhi partook in the Faculty of Pharmacy Community Engagement Programme (CEP) in 2016 and is currently a Facilitator for the same. She is now the youngest Advisory Committee Member for Scifest Africa, which further demonstrates her leadership skills and actions towards collaborative approaches to improve health outcomes.

In March 2020, Samridhi developed a COVID-19 information booklet for low- to semi-literate members to increase awareness and provide prevention measures. For this reason, Samridhi became part of the Rhodes University COVID-19 Science Engagement Team in which she provided insights on the content and poster designs for campaigns. Though this work is not part of her PhD project, such initiatives highlight her leadership, determination, and creativity towards serving the community during this global pandemic. Shamridhi has been active in the scholarship of engagement by publishing 2 articles and presenting at 6 international conferences.

Theodore Orlando Duxbury

Theodore Orlando Duxbury is a third year PhD candidate in Pharmacy Practice, done in collaboration with the Rhodes University Community Engagement Division. His work addresses health inequalities and facilitates rural health development by promoting epistemic justice, leadership, and health literacy strengthening at Rhodes University and in the Makhanda community.

Throughout his academic career he devoted his time to community engagement and community development, participating in different activities that promote health awareness and health literacy. These activities include lecturing undergraduates, workplace health promotion projects; National Science Festival exhibitions; student volunteering; student wellness; National Science Week workshops; and student mentorships. This all serves to illustrate his motivation and action towards holistically addressing the health and social challenges in Makhanda and the surrounding communities. He recognised that it is time to consider, not only the aspects of medical care but also its social eterminants. This serves as the ideal foundation from which a more productive society could be promoted. Collaborations across higher-education departments such as these, not only promote health and social change, it also moulds socially responsible and active healthcare practitioners and citizens. This is a true testament of what can be achieved when two higher education departments collaborate to achieve a strategic objective.

Theo is deeply committed to the research communities in which he spent time building relationships, understanding their lived experiences and responding meaningfully to challenges. This was evident when the Covid 19 Pandemic broke, Theo immediately took it upon himself to run workshops in all the villages in the Amakhala area before lockdown was imposed on us all. He made sure that the communities he had engaged with received the most current and accurate education about the virus that he could provide and that might ensure their safety. Such is the nature of this outstanding scholar – deeply ethical and compassionate.

Student Representative Council Leadership: Katlego Mpahlele (President) & Leboghang Makghosi Nkambule (CE Councillor)

The 2020 SRC has placed at the very heart of their mission, the cultivation of humanity – encouraging students to use their social capital to contribute to community development through the building of mutually beneficial partnerships with the Makhanda community. We started the year with a record number of 2 025 students engaging on a regular basis with the community through service learning and volunteer programmes. These large numbers had everything to do with this SRC team inspiring and encouraging students to become a part of community engagement at the University. Rather than allowing the pandemic to paralyse this incredible surge of involvement, this team sought alternate ways to contribute to society.

They facilitated virtual workshops with various halls on community engagement and environmental sustainability. Also, for the first time in history the SRC ensured CE visibility through inclusion at various O-week events and even started a series of webinars to address the challenges faced by students when volunteering such as language barriers and time management amongst other concerns. The SRC launched the #RUGrowing project, which aimed to provide skills and ecofriendly ideals of producing their own food through vegetable gardens in schools and in the community. They built on this idea by launching the #PlantedTheSeed, #RiverRescue, #BeachCleanUP and #PlasticFreeJuly amongst other initiatives.

The SRC team brought an energy to the student body which had a clear purpose, fully grasping the CE principles of building relationships and mutually beneficial partnerships, their hand in ensuring good practice was commendable.

The SRC have been led my two remarkable team players, getting behind and driving community engaged learning in ways we could not have imagined - this evening we salute the leadership of Katlego and Lebo - mature, principled and very dynamic and recognize them for a special award of excellence.



Daniel Proestos

Daniel is a first-time volunteer and best characterised as a passionate educationist. When the COVID-19 pandemic hit South Africa, Daniel knew that many of the learners that he had been tutoring as part of the Vulindlela program would need extra assistance, more than ever before. And so, he took the initiative to make and deliver Grade 12 maths video tutorials that learners could access via their cell phones. Daniel







sought innovative, open access software and created a large number of videos from lesson planning to editing and distribution – something that must have taken him hours and hours to do. This is a remarkable feat for a first time student having just been introduced to community engagement to have the courage and will to step up to emergency remote teaching too!

Daniel went above and beyond the call of duty by not only making the videos but also being readily available for any additional questions learners may have had. Sending videos seemed to be a huge hit with Daniels' students. One student even sent Daniel a message saying, "thank you. I honestly feel like videos do it for everyone. I swear I hate reading notes... I think other tutors should do videos as well."

On the surface, helping a teenager pass his or her final matric exams may seem like a small act, but the impact that such an act may have is incomprehensible. Many of these pupils might be able to further their education and lift their family and future generations out of poverty because of the innovation and commitment of a single student volunteer. The programme Co-ordinator, Thandi Nqowana commented that Daniel has been extraordinary this year finding innovative ways to communicate and keep the pupils stimulated with educational resources during the lockdown period so that they kept up with their studies. A combination of compassion, support and educational materials kept the pupils on track.

The RUCE office is very excited by the innovations and impact made by Daniel in one year and wish to acknowledge him for a year of excellence. He is a scholar to watch going forward.









Award Citations

GOLD AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (TOP 10) Otja Muruko

The energy and dedication that Otja exudes in the CE space is almost tangible. He has been a Residence CE Rep, Sports Club CE Rep and Student Leader in ECP... all in one year! Prior to this he has been an active team member in several CE programmes.

Otja's strength is his ability to work as a team, he is very supportive of his peers and community partners. He persistently works at understanding the CE context. He has learnt a lot in two years and demonstrates this in his leadership and relationships with students and community partners alike. He has a unique personality that draws people towards him. His nominator captured the way he lives the. principles of Community Engagement by saying "I was blown away by his passion, enthusiasm and commitment. On an overnight hike, I immediately noticed how easily he stepped into a role as a big brother figure and how quickly he was able to form meaningful relationships."

The alignment between his passion for the outdoors and youth development is the driving force behind much of the Grahamstown Scouts' Group success this year. He has also been recognized for "his super organized personality".

This energy and sustained dedication to change, no doubt, puts him in good stead for years of leadership in the CE space... a prospect, we're excited for as a division!

Nobesuthu Mkandla

Nobesuthu has been an active participant in her hall's CE initiatives and widely involved in mentoring and tutoring since her first year at Rhodes. In 2018, Nobesuthu started volunteering with the Inkululeko Youth Programme, where she tutored history for the Grade 12's. All her students passed with bachelors, one even getting a distinction. In 2020, Nobesuthu has been a student leader in the Vulindlela Programme where she worked closely with the program coordinator to organise the tutors and the Grade 10–12 learners for tutoring sessions. During the Covid–19 pandemic, she took it upon herself to tutor History for the Grade 10 and 12 learners in the program.

Notably she has also founded a public tutoring initiative aimed at assisting matric students in the country a particularly useful service during the COVID 19 school shutdown. In addition, Nobesuthu is the person who initiated the creation of the mentorship programme for first years in the Oppidan Hall.

Nobesuthu is a very dedicated tutor and mentor and has built warm relationships with the pupils. The parents of her pupils often call her as they trust her with their children and rely on her to advise and guide them in the education space. This shows how deeply engaged Nobesuthu was with not only the pupils but their families as well.







Leboghang Makghoshi Nkambule

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Lebo has served as a diligent CE Rep in Atherstone house since her second year at Rhodes. Through the inspiration of what she learnt in this position she went on to initiate her own mentorship programme that encourages school learners to implement sustainable change solutions to community challenges. The programme is now in its third year of providing academic and social support to matriculants at Nombulelo HIgh School.

Her dedication to CE has been recognise through many accolades: in 2018 her hall won the CE Hall of the year award, in the same year she received the community engagement top 10 award for excellence in community engagement, the Investec Top 100 for excellence in community engagement and the Jan Smuts hall excellence in Community Engagement consecutively. And so, it was no surprise that in 2019 she was elected as the 2020 SRC Community Engagement Councillor and more recently the 2021 SRC President.

In her capacity as the SRC CE Councillor she has implemented innovative, wide-spread awareness-raising campaigns, worked collaboratively with the RUCE office and fellow Councillors to infuse CE into the university structures. Her dynamic and charismatic leadership and depth of understanding of CE has encouraged large numbers of students to be involved in CE programmes.

Emma Wagenaar

Emma's nomination captures 2020 wonderfully saying, "Nothing worked out the way I intended it to, but in the end, everything worked out perfectly." For Emma, 2020 was a year of exponential growth. Her experiences leading up to 2020 had positioned her for a full year of community-based experiential learning. Despite the complications of this year, she has shown resilience, unbridled ambition, and relentless passion for CE. Her ability to embrace the change has given her the opportunity to deeply theorise and reflect on her context and career opportunities aligned to CE.

Emma has been a member of the Student Society, Inkwenkwezi since 2018 and has served on their committee for the last two years. In her role as chairperson this year she has led by example, completing all three of the courses RUCE offered during the lockdown and even found time to encourage fellow members to find opportunities to serve their community; wherever they were. As the CE Rep of the Kite surfing and Sailing Club she has shown commitment to the implementation and sustainability of CE projects from previous years and collaboratively planned initiatives for her year of tenure. She has also been part of the Fort England Buddy programme and an active BuddingQ leader and student trainer.

In her own words "2020 was the year I needed to grow as a student volunteer at Rhodes University, and I am excited for the future." As she should be, along with selecting to do an engaged research masters in 2021, Emma has been re-elected as the CE Rep for the Kite surfing and Sailing Club as well as elected to serve on the Student Sports Council Executive as CE Rep.







Bennita Tanaka Benza

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Bennita has been a registered student volunteer since her first year at Rhodes in 2018. In 2019, she became a mentor at GADRA, where she assisted grade 12 repeat matriculants under the Engaged Citizen Program. This year she is a student leader at GADRA. She has also worked with Grade 6 pupils as a tutor for english and mathematics at Archie Mbolekwa Primary School.

Bennita has been the Drostdy Hall Community Engagement Rep, a portfolio she took seriously. She organised many initiatives to raise funds for their community partner organisation and encouraged participation by all. Here, she worked closely with Noncedo pre-school in the Siyakana eMakana programme to boost school infrastructure and assist with school readiness programmes. She successfully spearheaded the residences' involvement in these projects and the hall was a finalist in the RUCE awards in 2019.

During the pandemic Bennita has shown, that leadership requires adaptability and courage, two qualities she has displayed, by continuing to volunteer even during difficult times. On her own initiative she learnt to sew and hand-stiched several children's facemasks for the 1000 masks campaign earlier this year and as the president of the Golden Key society she has mobilised students (scattered around the country) to work with their partners towards achieving sustainable development goals.

Londeka Zulu

Londeka has been a committed volunteer for 3 years. Her first volunteering escapade was in the Engaged Citizen Programme at the Jabez Centre where she worked closely with community partners and fellow volunteers to address the environmental issues around the center. Her experiences there leapfrogged her to embed herself in the education sector. She has been a volunteer at both ends of the education spectrum, a mentor in the Nine Tenths Matric Mentoring Programme and a Budding Q volunteer and leader in Grade R.

Such a broad range of experience has helped Londeka gain the contextual understanding of the assets and challenges in the communities she works with, which has substantially led to the successes in her volunteerism and leadership. Despite the challenges of 2020, Londeka has shown initiative, dedication, determination, and has stayed devoted throughout the year. As a leader in the BuddingQ Programme, she had the difficult task of facilitating sessions at CM Vellem, one of the largest schools of the programme and often the most dynamic groups.

She has engaged with several of the online opportunities in the BuddingQ programme and more than 80% of her group have received certificates as a result of her encouragement. As a volunteer in 9/10ths Programme, she has worked against all odds to mentor her mentees virtually, one of which has already been provisionally accepted to Rhodes. Her nomination concludes "I am honoured to be part of the change...all by doing something I wanted to do."







Luyanda Hadebe

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Since her teenage years, Luyanda has sought experiences as a positive change agent to contribute to South Africa's transformation. Her humility and gentle leadership probably leaves her extensive CE CV unnoticed by many. Luyanda has been involved in CE since she enrolled at Rhodes University In her first year she joined the Khanya Science and Maths Clubs and her Residence Reading Programme. She also joined the Engaged Citizen Programme as a volunteer at the Home of Joy, where she served for two years, a space she often called her second home.

In her second year she joined the 9/10ths Mentoring Programme and was also elected as a CE Rep in the Sisulu Residence. From 2019–2020 she continued as an ECP volunteer at Ulwazi and as a 9/10ths student leader. Luyanda's wealth of experience is evident in her leadership. As a student leader for Nine Tenths, she is often seen sitting alongside fellow mentors working through a problem with care and compassion. Simply put, she exemplifies 'teamwork' ensuring a better outcome for all.

Her four years of persistent and extensive dedication to Community Engagement at Rhodes is admirable and characteristic of Luyanda's dedication to effecting change, in her own words she writes "I have a zeal for seeing positive change in my community and working hard to make that happen." Uthandile Samela



Award Citations

Sydney Nel

Inkwenkwezi is a student led Community Engagement Society that facilitates early-grade literacy development. Sydney, as a linguistics student and avid literacy advocate has been part of the society for four years. She has played a significant role in the longevity of the student society.

2018 was a year of change for the society and in a moment of crisis, Sydney stepped up to the role of Chairperson; ultimately saving the society. Her ability to embrace this change and motivate the society's committee was a courageous feat that will have a lasting impact. The society now has over 50 members and has dedicated the last two years to refining and implementing their literacy development model and has creatively restructured the committee so that it is composed of positions that ensure sustainability, one such role is advocacy and volunteer training, which Sydney occupies with pride and an action-filled resolve.

In her own capacity she aligns her studies with her passion for CE and pursues opportunities that help her understand the alignment between these aspects of her life. This year, when face-to-face volunteering came to a halt with lockdown, she took the time to understand the theoretical aspects of CE through the courses offered through RUCE. In these courses she demonstrated a deep understanding of her own context, South Africa's literacy crisis and her role as a social change agent in social justice issues. Sydney characterizes Rhodes's motto 'where leaders learn' in her ability to think deeply, act bravely and commit wholeheartedly to the transformation of public education in our city.

Claire McCann

Claire is not the first person you will notice in the room, she is quietly spoken and it takes a little while before you get the full measure of her ability. She mostly starts conversations through enquiry, always interested in others and in learning through others. She brings a moral authority and dignity to any space she leads as well as a deep commitment to the transformation of this country, her thoughtful and generous character, her intellect and her clarity of thought.

As a mentor, tutor and leader in the high school space; over the last 4 years Claire has exemplified what it means to walk a journey with pupils. In 2016 and 2017 she started her own journey at GADRA as a mentor and later joined the 9/10ths Programme from 2019. It is interesting to note that three of the students Claire mentored have gone on to study at Rhodes University and she has maintained relationships with all of them. Claire also undertook the role of the Community Engagement representative for the Mountain Club, where initiates and coordinates a very active local Scouts group.

Claire is never vocal about her community engagement activities, but it is known that outside of the formal RUCE programmes she motivated her family to sew and contribute 100 children's facemasks over lockdown, made videos for RUCE archives and also offered regular tutoring and mentoring to Transnet pupils.

Her unique ability to apply her theoretical knowledge to the context has opened up a new scholarly opportunity – that of writing and publishing about her community engagement journey, an exciting coherence between teaching and learning, community engagement and research. Claire has recently been named a Rhodes Mandela Scholar and we have no doubt that her community engagement portfolio will have strengthened her application. Claire has embraced the Rhodes University experience in its fullness, carefully and deliberately choosing opportunities where she can meaningfully effect deep and lasting social change.







2020 Highlights

The Covid 19 pandemic has wrought unprecedented devastation on all human life and destroyed many economies across the globe. The 2020 year started with heightened levels of excitement and large numbers of students enrolling for community engaged learning programmes, the Rhodes Community Engagement team was ready and the course work and placement of students got underway. Then came the announcement of the President – lockdown and no face to face engagement, nothing could have prepared us for this but in RUCE style, we did not let what we can't do, interfere with what we can do – so we galvanised into action seeing the opportunity it presented for meaningful engagement.

We reimagined Community Engagement as a core function of the university, we mastered technologies for the introduction of online CE modules, we called on the various science departments to step with us into the crisis, we relied heavily on our community – university partnerships to run education campaigns, food security initiatives, the making and supply of PPE to essential services and schools, online psychosocial support, the production of academic content to support school pupils at home, community kitchen support, food garden interventions amongst other responses. We have worked around the clock and what a productive journey it has been, allow me to share some of the impact.



We are very grateful to our Donor Partners who stuck with us in these difficult times, supporting us as we navigated new ways of reaching those who were hurting most. Standard Bank and GBS Bank partnered with the ECD Forum and RUCE and have funded the installation of 54 water tanks in 43 Preschools in Makana and Ndlambe Municipality, a much needed resource during the pandemic. For the VC's Reviving Public schools initiative, we welcomed the Standard Bank, Tutuwa Trust who have committed to three years of funding.

BPSA has committed to 2 years, the Davies Foundation has funded us for 5 years, the Oppenheimer Memorial Trust for 3 years. Without you, this impact report would just not be the same – a sincere thank you for your compassion and investment in our community.

Over the past 5 years, RUCE has been driving the creation of third spaces to enable and grow Community/University partnerships – the formation of HUBS has brought cohesion and coordination in our community, all working to bridge the digital divide and more specifically – the Social Innovation HUB on campus has a focus on innovation, healing and digital storytelling, the ADC Hub in Joza has a focus on post schooling and social entrepreneurs and the third is the Joza Youth Hub, which has a focus on after school education support programmes for children.

This social innovation hub is the youngest of the 3rd spaces and was the outcome of a very exciting research partnership between 5 European Universities and 6 South African Universities in a project called the Common Good First Initiative, the brainchild of Glasgow Caledonian University in Scotland.







2020 Highlights cont.

Research: The number of research outputs from the Community Engagement Division has grown exponentially this year, our researchers are publishing in high impact international Journals. We have boosted our research team with four new Academics – Research Associates, Dr Sharli Paphitis and Dr Margie Maistry, NGAP Appointment, Thandi Nqowana, and newly appointed Dr Rene Oosthuizen who joins us from Stenden University. The 2019 Vice Chancellor's Distinguished Award Medal for Community Engagement was awarded to the dynamic Human Kinetics and Ergonomics team of Dr Jonathan Davy, Andrew Todd and Dr Ben Ryan.

An exciting development on the research front is the launch of the UNESCO Knowledge for Change K4C Hub at Rhodes on the 2nd November. This is a partnership with Durban University of Technology. The Knowledge for Change (K4C) Consortium is a global initiative of the UNESCO Chair in Community-Based Research and Social Responsibility in Higher Education, under the joint directions of Dr. Budd Hall (University of Victoria, Canada) and Dr. Rajesh Tandon (PRIA, India). This is an initiative to train the next generation of mentors and leaders in Community Based Research (CBR).

In the teaching and learning space, RUCE has continued to pioneer new ways of strengthening Service–Learning (SL) within Rhodes and across South Africa. The RUCE accredited online Community-Based Service-Learning course was over subscribed in 2020 with academics from over 6 Universities registering and completing the course. This course has successfully equipped academics with the theoretical knowledge and practical skills to create sustainable courses in partnership with community based organisations in order to improve knowledge exchange programs at the university and foster a new generation of engaged Rhodes graduates.

Another exciting new development in Student Volunteerism, was the launch of the first online short courses around the philosophy and theories of community engagement, we were delighted with the student's response – 515 students chose to participate and completed the course.









2020 Highlights cont.

There are 45 Community Partner organisations in Makhanda that participating in the 6 volunteer programmes and we thank them for receiving our student volunteers and the care they take in supporting their development. A first for us this year was a Community Partner organisation enrolling for one of the CE theory courses – 15 bachelor students from the College of Transfiguration are currently in the final stages of completing the course.

The Corvid Pandemic has wreaked havoc in the schooling sector, we are still to see the effects of this lost year of teaching and learning. The RUCE staff and student volunteers dug deep to make sure they were able to reach the pupils and show some support to the school leadership in Makhanda. In the high schools the tutoring and mentoring continued right through lockdown. It was more challenging to reach the younger children, but working through parents proved successful. An ECD WhatsApp initiative conceptualized and implemented by RUCE saw over 1000 parents receiving beautifully designed educational material in three languages daily for their children.

A highly successful partnership with GADRA Education, Faculty of Education and 4 high schools resulted in another successful year for the Nine Tenths Programme. Tonight we are awarding 91 RU mentors short course certificates. This qualification demands high levels of commitment: over 100 hours of work! This is the most we've awarded in any year and a testament to the dedication and commitment by student volunteers in very trying times. Student Mentors managed to keep the programme on track throughout lockdown for 183 Grade 12 mentees. In 2021, a Train the Trainer Nine Tenths programme will be offered to other interested Universities nationally.

213 student volunteers qualified for the Engaged Citizens programme certificate, 53 qualified for the Tutor Orientation course certificate and another 11 students qualified for the CE Reading Clubs Orientation course certificate.

The Vulindlea Programme targets our own staff at Rhodes in grades 1-6 and their school going children. Intensive support has continued online with 24 Rhodes Student Volunteers participating, 28 parents and 32 learners on board. 8 of the 12 Matrics have applied to RU because they meet the criteria. The journalism 3rd years have been an integral part of this programme.

We initiated a partnership with CSD, Department of Health and Social Development and the ECD Forum to assist Preschools open their doors once Lockdown level 1 was announced. We managed to get 52 of the 60 pre-schools up and running again.

In closing, we have been very blessed to have an SRC Council that is deeply invested and has walked the CE journey with us. This dynamic 2020 Council understand the power of community engagement to address issues of social justice and to promote transformation in our students and staff while making a strategic contribution to the development of our community – watch this leadership – our future is in good hands.
