


St Mary Hall

John Kotze House

Sub wardens

This brought about a more uniformed response to issues, from sub warden to sub warden, and from case to case. This is an exercise that I would like to spread into the Hall in 2020, as it not only boosts the confidence of the sub wardens greatly, but also boosts the confidence of the wardens in their subwarden team.

We had a successful R&S process for the sub-warden team of 2020, with two of the current sub-wardens, Nwabisa and Ongezwa, being successful for 2020, and a new sub-warden, Samkelisiwe, the 2019 Treasurer, joining the team. I look forward to the team growing from strength to strength and will enjoy watching Nwabisa and Ongezwa guide and empower Samke in her new role.

For the year of 2020, I have reintroduced the delegation of specific central rooms, per floor, as subwardens' rooms, to allow sub-wardens to be in a more centralized location, in order to monitor their corridors more effectively. The sub-wardens were hesitant in embracing the idea at first, but as I provided them more information on the benefits and the positive impact on their ability to do their job optimally, I have secured 100% buy-in. I look forward to seeing how this affects the discipline of the student in 2020.



House Committee

The House Comm were much more mature and in control of their portfolios in the second semester. They opened up more to my involvement, and were more engaged in getting guidance from me on events. We had very good events, and a Comm that was more active, one that showed up to all events.

I am very happy to report that St Mary Hall was a runner up to the 2019 Community Engagement Award, represented by the JK CE Rep, Sesona.

I was very proud to be sitting in the grazzle sessions, listening to the amazing plans that my ladies had in mind for their own home. Events


2nd Semester

Discipline

1st and 2nd Semester

Maintenance

The delay in the resolution of maintenance issues continues to be a concern. The washing machines and outside lights are the main concern as the delays are the most concerning.

Currently, all the safety lights that are mounted on the outside wall of the John Kotze building do not work. They do not switch on automatically, as they should when night falls. This has been the case for many months, and requisitions have been made, unsuccessfully.

That being said, our Hall Administrator, Brenda, and Housekeeper, Bulelwa, have a very good relationships with the building and maintenance division, and manage to follow up with success in most cases.

ANNUAL REPORT INPUTS FROM OLIVE SCHREINER HOUSE, ST MARY HALL

Housekeeping and maintenance continue to be a challenge for Olive Schreiner. Matters noted by students in the fix-it book, are left unattended for very long periods and even when indicated as addressed, the matters remained unresolved. Students even re-wrote issues in the book in the hopes that their matters will be attended to, but to no avail.

We had frequent challenges with electrical shortages in the common room. Since I started as house warden in February of 2019, 2 of the 6 power outlets have not been working in the combined big and small common rooms. Especially during exam times, students study in these venues and require access to power outlets. I have personally checked, and they are still not functional to this day, even after being reported often.

Lighting in and around the residence have been attended to, most of the lights reported have been fixed and are in working condition.

Dealing with noise around res is still a great challenge, especially over weekends and due to our res being situated right on the path that most students walk between upper campus and

town. I have also struggled with this, especially during exam times when students pass our res in the early morning hours. It is particularly hard to enforce any noise rules, because by the time one gets to the perpetrators, they have passed and are no longer within the perimeters of the hall. A security guard's presence during crucial times on the route passing OS would certainly deter students from being rowdy and causing such disturbance.

We still have not received any clarity on how to deal with instances where students are caught smoking marijuana – this is a common occurrence and the fact that the university has not taken an official stance on this, makes it challenging for wardens to deal with this matter.

The new hall rule, "Phoneless Thursdays" has been consistently applied and it seems that the residents are slowly embracing it. They hold each other accountable on Thursdays and engage in robust conversations during meal times. I think it was such a good initiative and we should definitely continue the implementation in 2020.

We had successful events during the second semester of 2019, most notably:

- Common room revamp, where myself and the House Committee cleaned, organised and renovated the small common room, turning it into a functional study area,
- A Community Engagement project where we painted the walls at Little Star Creche,
- · A House beach trip to Port Alfred and
- Our House Leavers' Dinner and Prizegiving

It was also during this semester that the unfortunate and tragic murder of Uyinene occurred. The residents were visibly shaken by this and we often had informal conversations in corridors and in the common room regarding gender based violence, xenophobia and many other topical matters that are reality in our country. The residents are very supportive of me and of each other and I truly value each and every one of them.

During the year the house did experience seniors who felt that they were above the house rules. This created disparities amongst the seniors and the sub-wardens. We also had a few bullying incidents which the warden attended too and discussed with the concerned students. The support received from the hall warden also helped in dealing with these incidents, and that was something we did not have in the hall previously from permanent hall wardens.

<u>Lillian Britten House</u>

This year in Lillian Britten has been marked by achievements and challenges.

On the one hand, academic performance in the house has notably improved from last year. We are particularly proud of our first year students who placed third out of all the residences in terms of

academic performance in the June examinations. This was a significant improvement from last year when, as a house of 42 students, 9 students failed more than 2 subjects in the June exams.

On the other hand, the vibrancy of residence life declined from previous years during 2019. After Founder's Lodge Annex returned back to Founders Hall, the number of students residing in Lillian Britten reduced to 30 students. Because of this, we were not able to fill all the House Committee positions we had available to us and this has affected the number of house events we were able to organise per semester. A champagne breakfast was held on Women's Day. We enjoyed drinks and snacks and discovered the sisterhood that comes from sharing an increasingly loud game of 30 seconds.
