This piece is a hybrid, a blend of Tadashi Suzuki's actor training style and Ted Hughes poetics.

Hanamichi is the name for the ramp used in traditional Japanese Noh Theatre for the performers' entrances and exits - directly translated as flower-path. The play fuses this ideal with that of Ted Hughes, specifically in his poem *The Thought Fox*, which charts the arrival of inspiration in eventually writing something. I was also interested in exploring the isolation, boredom and imagination in that place of inspiration-less-ness...

Actress: born Cape Town, South Africa 6 August 1923; married 1951 Vicomte d'Orthez (died 1989; two daughters); died Cape Town 27 October 2007.

"I conceptualised the 'Moira Lister Theatre Award' after the death of my mother in 2007 as a means of keeping her memory and her lifetime of theatrical achievements alive - with particular focus on today's young generation of South African theatre students. She was always an enthusiastic supporter of the innovative and exciting talent this country has to offer, and as such I felt a theatre award in her honour was a fitting tribute".

"Moira Lister was an accomplished actress whose regal bearing found her often cast in patrician roles, though she also had a splendid sense of humour - she was a regular on the first radio series of Hancock's Half Hour - and a versatility that ranged from acclaimed performances in Shakespearean tragedy to her award-winning display of farcical expertise in Move Over, Mrs Markham.

Lister performed until 2004, touring with her highly successful one-woman show about Noël Coward, and was subsequently given the Naledi Award, a lifetime achievement award for her services to the theatre in South Africa".

I vividly remember Doris, a quiet, gentle isiZulu woman, who was hired as a domestic worker by my mother some 28 years ago while my mother was pregnant with me. When I was born, my then newly divorced mother left me in the care of umam'Doris while she worked two jobs. There are photographs of me strapped to her back with a blanket, while she hung up washing and swept the floors of our house. She was obese and moved with colossal effort. Later I discovered this was due to her having type 1 diabetes, which went undiagnosed for many years, and which eventually led to her death in 1995. Even though she had 4 children of her own, she lived on my parents' property and looked after my younger sister and I, and all her children except one lived on a farm in Impendle in the midlands of Kwa-Zulu Natal. Her youngest son, Jerome, was raised alongside my sister and I. And even though we played together daily, the strangeness of his retreat into his families one room khaya every night, jarred with the opulence of the large house my family lived in, was always felt. The inception for the devising of *uSizo* was an attempt to rectify the complex and unresolved nature of my relationship with umam'Doris, which led me to an interest in the wider subject of domestic workers in South Africa, and the socio-political conditions that inform their lives. Through interviews conducted with women in and around Grahamstown, and in collaboration with the cast and their own personal stories, we have created a piece which attempts a glimpse into the highly compound and multifarious situations of maid and madame, the nannying of employers children, and the politicians who claim to speak for these workers.
