What is Harmful?

- Indicators only + targets
- Compliance culture
- Fear to fail
- Theory-practice disjunct ...



- While wetlands may collapse again, aliens invade again ...
- And short term cash injections fail to improve community well-being
- We don't fail fast to learn fast

What is Evaluated Reported?

- # of people employed
- # of training days
- # of hectares cleared
- # of wetlands restored
- Etc.

Questions & Answers

- How can we better evaluate national programmes?
- So that it doesn't become another MONSTER?

- Learning from MERL and applying learning for SAM
- Participatory multi-method (complement monitoring with case studies – base both on programme theory)
- With provisions for governance (humans and budgets)

What mix of methods could work?

- 1. Participatory monitoring against national indicators for aggregation
- 2. Case studies across contexts, systematically planned
- Programme theory developmentally surfaced and refined (PAR variant)

Monitoring data:	<pre># of training days # of new jobs # of hectares cleared # of wetlands rehabilitated</pre>
Case study questions:	 Where is the citizen monitoring working, for whom, and why? Where is it not working, and why? Where are the positive training outcomes, for whom, and why? Where are there no positive training outcomes, why? Where is access to natural resources increasing, for whom? Why?

evaluation questions:

What are we learning about working with citizen monitors?

What are we learning about the mechanisms for moving out of poverty through natural resource management programmes?

Nick Tilley is a professor within UCL's Jill Dando Institute of Security and Crime Science. He is also an Adjunct Professor in the Griffith Criminology Institute, Brisbane and Emeritus Professor of Sociology at Nottingham Trent University.
