HOW TO CALCULATE YOUR APS

The percentages achieved in National Senior Certificate examinations (preliminary and final examinations) will be allocated an Admissions Point Score (APS) using the percentage obtained for each subject. The sum of the six subject scores, excluding Life Orientation but including English and any other required subject(s) for the relevant programme, is considered when deciding on admission.



45 APS with the required English mark = automatic provisional offer

ADMISSION TO STUDY FOR A HUMANITIES DEGREE AT RHODES UNIVERSITY

NSC AND IEB

The application will only be considered for admission to the University if the applicant qualifies for a Bachelor's degree and the applicant satisfies the University requirements.

To qualify for a Bachelor's pass status, learners are required to take seven subjects, four of which are compulsory (TWO Languages, Life Orientation and either Mathematics or Mathematical Literacy) and three of the learner's own choice from the subjects on offer at the school. At least four of these subjects must be on a Level 4 (50%-59%) pass or above.

PLEASE NOTE: Obtaining the minimum requirement does not guarantee acceptance!

WHAT CAN I STUDY WITH THE SUBJECTS I DID AT SCHOOL?

The Faculty of Humanities offers an excellent liberal arts education – an education for life, and an education which is formative for almost any career choice. A liberal arts education provides students with critical reasoning skills, the ability to analyse and evaluate arguments, to probe for hidden assumptions. It allows students to enjoy the worlds of Arts, Languages and Social Studies amongst a variety of other subject offerings.

Students may take a combination of Humanities subjects without having done them at school, e.g., you may take History even if you have not done History as a matric subject, or Drama, or isiXhosa (there is a non-mother tongue stream and a mother tongue stream).
