CONSPECTUS

This report covers the period from January to December 2010.

Landmarks for this year include the following (further detail is included in the body of the report):

- The Director has been awarded the Gold Medal of the English Academy of Southern Africa. This is the highest award offered by the Academy, and is made for services to English in South Africa. He has recently been elected Chairman of the Grahamstown Foundation.
- From 2010, the Director of the ISEA assumes the title of HA Molteno Professor of English. The University has determined that this title will be accorded to any future Directors of the ISEA, provided the incumbents are appointed as full professors.
- It has been agreed that in future Wordfest will have a presence on the main programme of the National Arts Festival. Our deep appreciation goes to Festival Director Ismail Mahomed for this initiative.
- A cohort of 37 English teachers from the King William's Town and Queenstown Districts, funded by the ZENEX Foundation, enters its second year of study for a B.Ed in English Language Teaching.
- Simultaneously, a cohort of twenty English teachers from the eastern part of the province, funded by the Eastern Cape Department of Education, enters its second year of study towards an ACE in English Language Teaching.
- The Secondary School's Language Project continues to progress. An Eastern Cape teachers' Networking Conference, 9-11 April 2010, was attended by about 160 current and past ACE and BEd students, as well as several local Grahamstown teachers. The conference theme was 'Literacy and Language Teaching' and the range of topics covered in presentations included problems in primary education, reading, textbooks and stereotyping and teachers' professional development.
- The Eastern Cape English Educators' Association (ECEEA), a broad-based
 professional association of English teachers in the province, was launched at the
 second Networking Conference. The Association, initiated by the ISEA, is open to
 all English teachers in the province. It is hoped that the Association will eventually
 expand its scope to include all language teachers.
- The ISEA has benefitted significantly from the energy and fresh insights of a visiting Fellow, Dr Eva Yerende, who participated in the Teachers' conference and the programmes of the Secondary Schools Language Project. Our thanks go to the United States' Regional English Language Office, in particular Eran Williams and Francina Magoro, to whom we are indebted.
- A collection of essays by members of the Institute and the Education Faculty at Rhodes, based on experience of English education at secondary level in Eastern Cape Schools, is in preparation. The book, which sets out to help improve the quality of education available to rural communities, will go to publishers in 2011.

- A concerted effort to support the Rhodes eResearch Repository project has to date resulted in upwards of 50 ISEA publications being lodged in the facility.
- The New Coin: South African Poetry Group on Facebook has proved popular with fans and contributors, with 244 members joining to date. Given the immediacy and vigorous discussion this avenue affords, we are striving to translate this support into subscriptions, particularly from those who contribute to the magazine. As an incentive it has been decided that contributors will no longer receive a free copy of the magazine. We have, however, chosen not to charge page fees as we would not like to preclude potential contributors for financial reasons. We also intend to mount a campaign to increase subscriptions from former contributors next year.
- Due to funding delays and competition from the Soccer World Cup, Wordfest 2010 was scaled-down, and had an Eastern Cape rather than a national focus. Nonetheless it was a very successful component of the National Arts Festival, as evidenced by increased language representivity (with Afrikaans writers returning) and in the number of new publications launched. In total 20 books were launched as well as *Ibutho* magazine and the latest volume of *Isivivane*.
- The Masters degree in Creative Writing has been approved as part of the University's programme mix by the National Department of Education, and has also been provisionally approved by SAQA and the HEQC. The new programme, has met with support from the Rhodes Institutional Planning Committee and the Vice-Chancellor. The course has been advertised and applications for 2011 are steadily coming in, ahead of the 31 October 2010 deadline.

STAFF News

The Director has been on academic leave from July. During this time he has been furthering his research projects and spent two weeks in the UK (see below).

We welcomed a new staff member to the Secondary Schools Language Project: Ms Samantha Cassels as Assistant Coordinator, to replace Ms Philomena Aziakpono.

We hosted Dr Eva Yerende, a visiting senior research fellow in the Institute from January to mid-July, 2010. Dr Yerende contributed to our in-service teacher education programmes and joined the research effort focused on data collected from the Secondary Schools Language Project. She also delivered a keynote address at the 2010 conference for English Teachers, 'The teaching of poetry and the poetics of teaching', wrote an article for the first edition of an online journal, *Teaching English Today*, and a short article, 'The importance of print-rich environments' in the local, *Grocott's Mail*.

Professor Mike Marais relinquished his position as editor of *English in Africa* after the first issue of 2010 and the position was advertised.

Dr Jane Starfield of the Department of English at the University of Johannesburg, who served as Co-editor of *English in Africa*, was appointed sole editor from June 2010.

RESEARCH

- Ntombekhaya Fulani is completing her M.Ed thesis titled 'Investigating literacy development in grade 4 English and Xhosa language textbooks: A comparative study.' She is also completing a book chapter.
- Madeyandile Mbelani is currently developing a PhD proposal to investigate the role of visual literacy within the English (FAL) curriculum in a rural context. He is also completing a book chapter.
- Monica Hendricks continues her work as part of the ABLE (Additive Bilingual Education) research project. By the end of 2010, she will have collected three years of classroom writing in English from two learners at Sosebenza Community School in Tarkastad. This data set will enable her to analyse the literacy development of these learners within the Intermediate Phase, a potentially significant contribution as there are very few longitudinal education research studies in South Africa. She intends to continue tracking the writing of these two learners in the Senior Phase, and to explore their evolving identity as bilinguals.
- Research into the impact of the ISEA's ACE and BEd (ELT) intervention is under way, in the form of a book. The post-tests of learners' and teachers' English proficiency will take place at the end of 2011.
- Laurence Wright continues his research into the reception of Shakespeare in South Africa and its spread in parts of the southern hemisphere.

Tessa Kirkaldy, Brendon Robinson and Nicci Hayes continue to teach on the ACE and BEd in ELT.

On the 16 January the Steering Committee members met in preparation for the conference in April.

The 'Networking' conference, 9-11 April, was attended by about 160 people, mainly current students and alumni of the ACE and BEd programme, as well as local Grahamstown teachers and academics. The conference included a range of presentations on reading, textbooks and stereotyping, and teachers' professional development, as well as more inter-active workshops where participants engaged in animated discussion about their own experiences as educators. The keynote speaker, Prof Brahm Fleisch, offered an excellent over-view of challnges in primary education. A former Zenex-sponsored ACE students from Fort Beaufort, Mr Bushula, won a book prize for his report on how he has sustained his extensive reading programme. A highlight of the event was the launch of the Eastern Cape English Educators' Association, and the adoption of its constitution.

Of the initial 2009 intake of 20 ACE and 37 BEd in-service students, there are currently 16 ACE and 32 BEd students as several failed the 2009 December examination or dropped out due to ill-health.

One student from the 2007-8 ACE cohort, on an extended DP, graduated in April 2010.

RESEARCH PUBLICATION

Work has begun on a collection of essays to capture the experience of ISEA and other Rhodes researchers working at the project of improving the quality of English education available to citizens in the rural Eastern Cape.

CAMPUS CREATIVE WRITING PROGRAMME

In its 14th year, the ISEA creative writing course is as popular as ever, with 35 people completing the course this year, some of them for the second or third time. As usual, the course runs for 16 Thursday evening sessions and is open to anyone in Grahamstown, not only Rhodes students. The range of applicants is extended thanks to the Grahamstown Training College Trust Fund, which provided bursaries for 13 aspiring writers who could otherwise not afford the fees.

Participants gain confidence an experience as they overcome their inhibitions to write spontaneously in a range of genres. At the same time they learn to give and receive constructive feedback and edit their work.

The course facilitators have once again risen to the challenge of creating writing exercises that inspire different styles and genres among the diversity of age, culture, and interests of the students. The 2010 edition of *Aerial*, the course publication, is being prepared for printing.

WORDFEST 2010

Wordfest 2010 took place as planned from Saturday 19 to Wednesday 23 June during the National Arts Festival. The decision to hold over Wordfest national for financial and logistical reasons this year meant that the convenor was able to dedicate more time to Wordfest Eastern Cape.

The Eastern Cape Department of Sport, Recreation, Arts and Culture (SRAC) was once again the core funder, providing a grant of R250 000.00. This has remained unchanged since the inception of the project ten years' ago. Our thanks also to PanSALB and Rhodes for their support.

The management team comprising writers themselves continued to improve their skills. The standard documentation has been improved over the years and it is pleasing to note that the event is becoming more and more self-run.

Kwam eMakana, the township bed and breakfast scheme which houses the writers, increased their rate from R200 a night to R250 a night. This meant that the number of writers had to be reduced from 140 to 105. Writers rated their accommodation using a questionnaire. Their positive overall response indicated a welcome improvement in the standard of accommodation.

As in previous years the selection of writers took place at the district level during mini-Wordfests in different parts of the province. Planning began in March and concentrated inter alia on diversifying the language usage during the event.

At the opening which followed the annual street parade of writers, the MEC for Sports, Arts and Culture, Mrs Xoliswa Tom, again lavished praise on Rhodes University, thanking the University for providing the venue and the administration, saying she and her colleagues felt 'at home'.

Writers participated in plenary sessions where English and isiXhosa were primarily used. The SeSotho group who numbered about twenty people broke away to read and discuss their work. The Department allocated a person to recruit Afrikaans-speaking writers and in fact two events were held in Port Elizabeth prior to Wordfest where writers were selected. Due to maladministration the initiative fell through. There were some twenty book launches, published in Afrikaans, English, isiXhosa and seSotho, as well as *Ibutho* magazine and the latest volume of *Isivivane*. The writers were again privileged to hear Mrs. Nombulelo Baba, of the Centre for the Book, speak about the role of the Centre in encouraging reading and writing. She also explained how writers could access the community publishing grant. After the writer's meeting, Mr Lukhanyo Sigonyela of PanSALB issued PanSALB-sponsored certificates of participation to all the writers.

The Media Officer continued on last year's initiatives to build working relationships with community radio stations and numerous interviews with authors were conducted, reaching approximately four and a half million listeners in all.

The pre-festival administration involves the issuing and receipt of contracts, payments to the writers and registration. This remains the responsibility of the ISEA admin team.

As usual their accurate and careful work laid the foundations for another successful event and I would like to thank here Carol Leff and Nomangesi Kelemi. Thanks are also due to Mary Fike, Kim Nell and Samantha Leighton of the Rhodes Finance Division for their substantial contributions.

The convenor would also like to thank the short-term part-time contract staff whose skills and enthusiasm make such a difference, namely Lorna Meaton and her team in Eden Grove, Sonwabile Mfecane, Maphaseka Wagner, and Pamela Timakwe.

Indeed, many of the past students of the creative writing programme are now interested in pursuing the MA in Creative Writing. This new degree programme has achieved national accreditation and University support and will launch in 2011 with an initial intake of eight students.

The robust performance of our well-established periodicals is due in no small measure to the willing service of editors who devote countless hours of intellectual energy and no small measure of tact and emotional intelligence to the task of serving the South African academic community and the far-flung readerships these publications attract.

We are grateful to all the editors, to the researchers, the reviewers and to the production and distribution staff.

We are deeply appreciative of the level of cooperation evident among the English-related initiatives at Rhodes, including particularly Dirk Klopper, Sarah Murray and the Director and staff of the National English Literary Museum.

It remains for me to thank all members of the ISEA team, the research associates, teachers and facilitators; the scholars, editors, writers and poets; the administrators, the cleaners, the referees, the examiners, the technical staff; together with the management, financial and administrative teams of Rhodes University, for enabling the Institute to flourish and make a salutary impact on educational and human challenges out of all proportion to its core size.
