



### Important notice for all RefWorks users

A new version of RefWorks (New RefWorks) has recently been launched by the developers, Proquest. Currently, the new version will run alongside the existing version of RefWorks (now referred to as "Legacy RefWorks"). Legacy RefWorks will only be available until **early 2019**.

**ProQuest does not recommend migrating to New RefWorks if one is on a deadline or currently working on a project using Write-N-Cite. Papers started in Legacy RefWorks will not be compatible with New RefWorks, so users should maintain their references in their Legacy RefWorks account until they complete their work.**

### Migrating from Legacy RefWorks to New RefWorks

You can migrate your account and data from the Legacy version to New RefWorks:

1. Sign in to the Legacy version
2. Select the link at the top of the screen "Move to the new version of RefWorks..."

Once the migration is complete, you will want to choose the ProQuest RefWorks option the next time you sign in as well as when exporting citations from library databases.

This update to RefWorks is a new way to collect, organize, annotate and cite research publications. It has the same functionality as the old Legacy RefWorks and an easier-to-use, more intuitive interface.

### Signing up for New RefWorks

If you don't have an account, you can create a New RefWorks account:

Go to <https://refworks.proquest.com> and click the "sign up" link.

Fill in your information making sure to use your institutional email address (you can't sign up with @yahoo.com, @gmail.com, etc.). Using your institutional email address will help us know whether you are entitled to an institutional account.
