FACULTY OF COMMERCE:

The Faculty of Commerce offers three degrees at the undergraduate level and comprises four departments: Accounting, Economics, Information Systems, and Management. The faculty prepares its graduates for the leading roles they will be expected to play in their professional lives in the new millennium.

FACULTY OF EDUCATION:

Rhodes University offer two ways to qualify as a professional teacher;

- Through a four-year Bachelor of Education (Foundation Phase Teaching) degree
- By completing a bachelor's degree in another faculty and then cap it with the one-year Postgraduate Certificate in Education (PGCE)

If you are planning to do a PGCE, please check your undergraduate curriculum with the Dean of Education. This is to ensure you have the appropriate subjects required for teaching in your undergraduate degree.

3. ADMISSIONS

FACULTY OF HUMANITIES:

The Faculty of Humanities is by far the largest faculty at Rhodes University with 11 academic departments and 2 schools, it offers a rich variety of courses within four broad categories:

- Arts: Drama, Fine Art, isiXhosa
- Languages: isiXhosa, English, Afrikaans, English Language and Linguistics, French, German, Latin, Greek and Chinese
- Professional Courses: Journalism and Media Studies
- Social Studies: Sociology, Psychology, Anthropology, Political Studies, History, Philosophy, Art History and Visual Culture and Classical Civilisation

The Faculty of Humanities offers a very wide range of possible degrees and course combinations. Students can major in Journalism and Politics, Classics and French, German, isiXhosa, Afrikaans or any other language offered or Management and Industrial Sociology or Organizational Psychology, Fine Art and History, Information Systems and English or Philosophy, Anthropology, Computer Science and Music, Mathematics, Drama or Linguistics. There are many possible combinations; students are requested to read the rules of their degrees to make sure they are on track to complete their degree within the allocated period. The faculty offers an excellent liberal arts education - an education for life which is formative for any career choice. A liberal arts education provides students with critical reasoning skills, in particular, the ability to analyse and evaluate arguments, to probe hidden assumptions to organize complex material in coherent ways. A Humanities Degree enhances student's ability to understand the views of others, to communicate well, to cope with ambiguity and uncertainty, and to acknowledge one's own ignorance. An education introduces students to the formative moments of their histories, societies, and their identities. It allows students to enjoy works of music and drama and literature and languages. All of the above may be combined with degrees or courses, which are more immediately career-orientated than the liberal arts education. Specialised degrees in Journalism or Fine Art or Music are offered. However, all within the context of a broader, rather than technical education. A Humanities Degree opens worlds; it provides education and not training. As such, it provides students with critical skills and characteristics, which are so important for our individual and national development.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

NSC AND IEB:

The application will only be considered for admissions to the University if the applicant qualifies for a bachelors degree study and the applicant satisfies the University's requirements.

Applicants must note that obtaining the minimum requirements does not guarantee acceptance.

Dean's Discretion:

If the applicant does not meet the required admissions point score (APS) of 45+ points for automatic acceptance, you may still be considered for a place at the Dean's discretion. Such placements are usually offered to applicants with an APS of a minimum of 36-44 points with some special conditions (see extended studies programme). It is, therefore, essential to give full information when completing the application form as this information will form part of the discretion-making process by the Dean.

Rhodes is part of a small group of research intensive universities in South Africa, and significantly, the only research-intensive university located outside a major urban area. The Rhodes 'general formative degree', allow students to choose two subjects as majors, offering enormous flexibility within and across faculties.

All Faculties: Life Orientation is not counted for points, but you're required to obtain at least Level 4 (50%) for acceptance.

EXTENDED STUDIES PROGRAMME:

As an alternative route to studies at Rhodes, a limited number of students who show great potential are exposed to a carefully designed and supportive learning environment, which enhances their ability to succeed. This option is for students from disadvantaged backgrounds, on condition that they extend their degree over an extra year. It is, therefore, essential full information is provided when completing the application form as this forms part of the discretion-making process by the Dean.

National Benchmark Tests (NBT):

It is recommended that all first-time university entering South African applicants write the NBT. If the applicant does not meet the automatic entry requirements, the NBT results will form part of the Dean's discretion-making on applications. These test results can also be used if a candidate does not meet the entrance requirements in their final examinations.

ADMISSIONS

FACULTY OF LAW:

The Bachelor of Law (LLB) degree is the minimum academic qualification for practising law in South Africa. At Rhodes University, the LLB degree is offered as a four-year programme, a two-year programme, or a three-year programme. The faculty admits a small number of LLB. However, most students who wish to pursue legal studies will register for a general degree in another faculty. Students may select courses from a wide range of subjects and a variety of permutations exists. Only in their second year do students decide which route to follow, which also enables students who discover in their first year that they are not suited to a career in law to change their study direction without forfeiting a year of study. The faculty's resources are limited, and students' academic results play an essential role when applications for admission into the LLB are considered.

There are two tests which are written throughout the year at various centres;

- The **Academic and Quantitative Literacy test (AQL)** consists of two components, namely, academic literacy and quantitative literacy. All applicants should write the AQL test.
- The **Mathematics test (MAT)**, this test is for applicants who wish to enter the following faculties: Commerce, Pharmacy and Science.

INTERNATIONAL REQUIREMENTS:

An APS of 40 points and above will receive a firm offer, 37-39 points will remain on hold until the end of September to be considered by the Dean if space is available. Candidates who offer a combination of Advanced Level (A), Advanced Subsidiary Level (AS), Ordinary Level (O), Higher International Certificate of Secondary Education (HIGCSE) and International General Certificate of Secondary Education (IGCSE), five different subjects are counted. The basic minimum requirements for admission to the University is a certificate of Full Exemption or Foreign Conditional Exemption from the Matriculation Board (visit: <https://mb.usaf.ac.za/online-assessment-and-application>).

Applicants who have passed A levels are eligible for full exemption provided the passes in approved subjects meet the following requirements:

For candidates who offer A and O levels and HIGCSE and IGCSEs, five different subjects are counted. An additional one fifth (1/5) of the total is added to this total. Zimsec students only deduct three points for a final count.

FACULTIES

FACULTY OF PHARMACY:

The Bachelor of Pharmacy degree is registered on the NQF as a Level 8 qualification and it is a four-year degree. The curriculum for this degree is set by the South African Pharmacy Council. Pharmacy comprises of several subjects concerned with the production, custody, distribution and use of medicines. Pharmacists play a supporting role in guiding and evaluating patient medication treatment to ensure patient safety.

The work of a registered pharmacist may be performed in the following sectors: manufacturing, wholesale and distribution, community, hospital, research or academia.

In the final year, students are permitted to select two electives offered in the Faculty of Pharmacy or in other Faculties and undertake a research elective, provided they are relevant to Pharmacy.

FACULTY OF SCIENCE:

The ordinary first degree is taken over three years, and the key feature of the Bachelor of Science degree (BSc) is its flexibility. Within the confines set by the timetable, students can combine subjects in myriad ways to create curricula that meet their interests. This flexibility includes allowing students to take a major subject from Commerce, the Humanities and Law such that students can major in Environmental Science and Anthropology, Biochemistry and Law or Geology and Economics.

The BSc does not set out to educate or train a student for a career but instead allows for the construction of a knowledge and skills base that prepares a student for a wide range of possible careers or advanced study in their chosen subject. The flexibility in curriculum design creates an opportunity for students to decide if they are attracted to trans-disciplinary academic training and education.

ACCOMMODATION:

Approximately half of our students reside within our 55 residences, while the other half stay off-campus and are referred to as Oppidans.

Residences:

The Rhodes residential system is key to the tradition of friendship and kinship. Currently consisting of fourteen halls of residences, each housing between 50 to 120 students, grouped around a central dining hall. Each residence has four houses which have individual constitutions, rules and traditions. Some halls have both men's and women's houses, while others are for men or women only.

Although most student rooms are single, some first-year students may be allocated to the few double rooms in various residences; an application may also be made for a double room. The residences are run by hall wardens who are responsible for the general organisation and management of the hall, with the hall committee, acting as an advisory body. Hall and house wardens are always available to help and advise students, but their function is not that of a surrogate parent or 'watchdog'. Rules are kept to a minimum, but are there to maintain an orderly, peaceful environment conducive to studying and community living.

Oppidans:

An Oppidan is an inhabitant of a University town, a student living off-campus in accommodation rented independently of Rhodes University, also known as an Oppi in short.

There is an Oppidan Committee whose purpose is to engage with students and look after their interests through keeping open channels of communication. They also assist Oppidan students by providing a support base in the transition between schools and University. They organise events to foster a sense of togetherness so that Oppies do not feel excluded from university life because they do not live on campus. Advice is given on signing lease agreements and being an employer. Through the Oppidan Committee, first-year students can request to be assigned a mentor who will assist them adjust and settle to the university life off-campus.

Oppidans have access to facilities such as the Stephen Bantu Biko building, where the Oppidan dining hall is located, as well as the Oppidan common room where students can relax and have tea and coffee, watch TV or play a game of pool in-between lectures. Free bus service is available until 22:00 PM on weekdays to transport Oppidans.
