

The event was concluded with the team filling up their glasses to toast to a successful year despite challenges, and an award ceremony which was chaired by Chris Jackson from LIMA.

















## **Key Activities to date**

The Tsitsa Project is committed to the work that it does by implementing processes that ensures collaboration with and capacity development of the Tsitsa community.

# Monitor Capacity Development Short Course

The course was initiated in 2019. Module 3, entitled: Listening and Speaking training: Participating and Influencing Polycentric Governance Processes, was adapted for online learning due to Covid-19 restrictions. The training was conducted with a blend of online and socially-distanced face to face sessions. A small group of facilitators from



the RU TP team (Ntombekhaya, Nosi and Anele) travelled to Maclear and together with LIMA (Chris, Sipha and Chumani) coordinated and facilitated the face to face session with 15 Monitors at the LIMA office. Matthew, Notiswa, Ant, Tally and Mateboho participated and presented content via zoom (presentations were projected to the Monitor group in Maclear). The training was predominantly conducted in isiXhosa, with translations either way. This is important for the Tsitsa Project because it enables meaningful participation and engagement.













## Tsitsa Research-Policy Colloquium

On the 15<sup>th</sup> Oct 2020 Tsitsa Project held a Research Policy Colloquium. This event is a platform for Tsitsa Project affiliated students and researcher to showcase and share their work with the wider Project and its stakeholders.

The work that was presented covered themes 1-3, and the colloquium was concluded with key policy messages.

- SESSION 1: Research, policy, and participatory governance
- **SESSION 2: Observation** systems and decision-making for complex systems
- SESSION 3: Sustainable land management and rehabilitation
- SESSION 4: Key policy messages from the Tsitsa Project.


